

Deux-Montagnes Lions Club to renovate facilities with \$25,000 grant

Rosemère mayor Leduc loses support of two more councillors

Marie-Andrée Bonneau and Daniel Simoneau become independents



Rosemère town council is now split, with three councillors supporting Mayor Madeleine Leduc and three who have chosen to sit as independents.

During Rosemère's Feb. 13 town council meeting, two more town councillors announced their decision to break away from Mayor Madeleine Leduc's team, leaving just three councillors aligned with the mayor now.

Councillor Eric Westram had previously announced he was no longer willing to follow the leadership of Leduc. As well, Westram announced last fall that he will be a candidate for mayor in the municipal election in November. In the meantime, councillors Guylaine Richer, Normand Corriveau and Kateri Lesage are still on side with Mayor Leduc.

Newly-independent

The newly-independent councillors, Marie-Andrée Bonneau and Daniel Simoneau, issued a press release together. "Mrs. Bonneau and Mr. Simoneau expressed their pride in the accomplishments they have contributed to over the past three years and are particularly pleased with the city's excellent position," they said, while adding that they both did extensive work as members of town council's finance committee.

"However, both of them consider that the communication and listening of the Rosemère citizens should be clearly improved," they added. "The time is over when, during an electoral mandate, decisions are made with little contact with voters even if it is done with the best will in the world," stated Simoneau, possibly alluding to some key decisions made by the Leduc administration, including the sudden closing of Rosemère's fire department.

While neither he nor Bonneau directly criticized Leduc, Bonneau hinted. "Often the people who approach me do not understand the deadlines for communications, the incomplete answers or the lack of transparency," she said

in their statement. "To this I reply that I want to do things differently."

More news in a few months

Bonneau and Simoneau said they are reflecting on what they plan to do politically in the future and that they'll make their decision known in a few months. They said they plan to be active on social media like Facebook and they could even hold public events.

Reacting to Simoneau and Bonneau's decision, Mayor Leduc said in an interview with the North Shore News that they were free to make their own decisions, but that in the meantime she and her remaining team members are continuing to do the job for which they were

elected. "We're going to follow through right to the end," she said.

The mayor later issued a formal statement to the media. "Like my colleagues Kateri Lesage, Guylaine Richer and Normand Corriveau, I am puzzled by the comments made by Marie-Andrée Bonneau and Daniel Simoneau," she said. "The municipal council caucus on which they sat is part of the town's structure for

the analysis of issues. It allows the unfettered expression of ideas and encourages debate among its members.

Mayor Leduc's statement

"This is a forum for expressing one's view-points in a totally transparent manner," Leduc continued. "Indeed, Mr. Simoneau and Ms. Bonneau have always been encouraged to speak up and make their opinions known. In fact, they have exercised this prearogative over the past three years, hence our astonishment. We are all the more surprised, since they have expressed their pride and solidarity with decisions taken since 2013 in the best interests of Rosemèrites."

Leduc added, "I wish to assure our residents

that we will continue to work with the same enthusiasm, honesty and righteousness as we have since the start of our mandate. Kateri Lesage, Guylaine Richer, Normand Corriveau and I continue to focus on ensuring Rosemère residents an outstanding quality of life in keeping with their ability to pay. We remain firmly committed to the strict management of the

town's finances."

Hasty change to Canada's electoral system never made sense

Before any changes are made or any referendums held, Canadians must understand that many of the proposed alternatives come with drawbacks

The federal government is walking away from its campaign promise to change the way Canadians vote in federal elections. Given that the task was always going to be complicated and the results messy, the decision is understandable.

In his recently-released mandate letter to Karina Gould, the newly-appointed minister of Democratic Institutions, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau said that "changing the electoral system will not be in your mandate."

Trudeau justified his change in intention by saying that "a clear preference for a new electoral system, let alone a consensus, has not emerged. Furthermore, without a clear preference or a clear question, a referendum would not be in Canada's interest."

Had a referendum taken place - and it should have - Canadians needed to fully understand that while there may be benefits to other electoral systems, there are also drawbacks.

Consider a proportional representation (PR) system, which the special parliamentary committee recommended in December. While

many may know about the potential benefit of distributing seats in Parliament more closely to vote shares, there are also costs.

For example, a recent study found that a move to PR would likely lead to higher government spending and larger federal deficits. The study found that the average size of central governments from 2000 to 2014 in countries with PR was almost 25 per cent larger than in countries with majoritarian/plurality election rules similar to what Canada now uses. The study also found that PR countries tend to finance this extra spending by running larger deficits.

The reason? PR systems tend to elect more parties to the legislature, increasing the likelihood for coalition governments. In order to form coalitions, larger parties must gain the support of smaller parties, often by capitulating on their main issues, which leads to higher levels of government spending.

Moreover, smaller parties in PR systems are able to exert a disproportionate amount of power at the expense of the preferences of the majority of voters who didn't vote for such parties.

We should also consider the drawbacks of the alternative vote (AV) or ranked ballots system, another reform option. This system has the potential to reduce competition in our elections, a key attribute of a healthy democratic system.

For example, another study examined the impact adopting AV rules would have had on Canada's seven federal elections between 1997 and 2015.

The study found that just one party - the Liberals - would have gained seats in every election. In fact, they would have gained an average of 19 seats per election. To a lesser extent, the NDP would have increased their seat totals in more recent elections. Only the Conservatives would have lost seats every election.

The study also found that AV rules would have changed the outcomes in a number of elections, including in 2006, when instead of a Conservative minority government, the Liberals would have won a minority.

Before any changes are made or any referendums held, Canadians must understand that many of the proposed alternatives come with drawbacks. Changing the electoral system in a hasty manner was never going to be in the interest of Canadians.

The government should be congratulated for its willingness to make a tough political decision that's in the best interests of all Canadians.

Trudeau's economic policies suicidal in wake of Trump quake

Clinging to his current policies could prove to be the biggest mistake made by any Prime Minister in Canadian history

Troy Media/ - Donald Trump's election victory set off a political earthquake that has deeply shaken Americans. Earthquakes are often followed by devastating tsunamis generating huge waves travelling far beyond the quake epi-centre. Yet, even as those "Trumpquake" waves threaten to sink our economic ship, Prime Minister Justin Trudeau seems determined to maintain his pre-quake course.

Here are some of the dangerous shoals that lurk along that perilous route:

•Trump is anti-free trade. His advisors have said that Canada isn't their target. Even if that's true, the recent decision by General Motors to move 600 jobs to Mexico demonstrates that Trump's protectionist bullets can ricochet across our border. Given his bombastic threats, there's no way auto makers will move jobs from the U.S. to Mexico, so their only option is to move those jobs from Canada. Making matters worse is the new administration's plan to exempt export revenues from income tax, while disallowing imported goods as a tax expense. These damaging actions are occurring even before NAFTA comes up for reconsideration. Trudeau is pivoting towards China as an offset to Trump protectionism. But a free trade agreement with corrupt and opportunistic China would be strategically and ethically unwise. Canadians keep their word, while the Chinese are notorious for saying one thing and doing another. And given Trump's animosity towards China, free trade discussions with China are sure to damage Canada's negotiations with his administration. One can easily envision him exclaiming, "We will not allow NAFTA to be used to give China free access to America".

•Trump plans to slash corporate tax rates to 15 per cent, erasing Canada's previous advantage that saw U.S. companies changing domicile through reverse takeovers. Adding Trudeau's carbon tax tips the tax scales in America's favour. Moreover, Trump's "Buy America First" policies will be a strong deterrent to creating or expanding operations in Canada that target U.S. markets. All this bad news comes when Canadian business investment has already been dropping for eight consecutive quarters.

•Trump plans to reduce the top federal personal income tax rate to 33 per cent, while Trudeau's increases on higher income earners raised the top rate to 33 per cent. Sounds like a tie, until state and provincial taxes are considered. Seven U.S. states have no income tax and, with the exception of California, taxes in those that do are much lower resulting in combined rates of between 33 and 42 per cent, compared with Canada's 49 to 54 per cent. This presents a serious impediment to attracting and retaining skilled, highly mobile workers.

•Trump wants to encourage more oil production to create jobs and reduce imports. Trudeau recently told Albertans he wants to "phase out" oil production. Perhaps he's unaware of oil's crucial importance to Canada's balance of trade, generating as much net export revenue as the next nine of our top 10 exports combined.

•Trump wants to streamline the regulatory process for new oil pipelines. Trudeau is contemplating a new regulatory process featuring even more extensive "social licence" consultations that have already seen economically important projects stymied for many years.

•Trump wants more natural gas hydraulic fracturing, a key contributor to jobs in some of the country's poorest states. Meanwhile, the Federal Government continues to hand some \$18 billion per year in equalization payments to the four so-called "have not" provinces that

have banned fracking. Perversely, the funding of those payments has come almost entirely from tax revenues of oil and gas producing provinces. But now the economies of those provinces, and the federal tax revenues from them, have collapsed. Under the three-year rolling average calculation of the equalization formula, payments to the four frack-shunning provinces will start a precipitous drop at the same time as Trump-quake takes its toll on Canada's economy.

•Trump supports coal-fired power generation. Trudeau wants to replace coal-fired power with much more costly "green" alternatives. That will add more challenges to the struggling economies of Alberta, Saskatchewan, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick which don't have hydro-power alternatives.

The federal government recently released a study projecting three decades of continuous budget deficits that would double national debt to an incredible \$1.5 trillion. That's an unconscionable legacy to leave on the shoulders of young Canadians and their offspring. And the federal study didn't consider the above Trumpquake impacts that are certain to make that terrifying debt scenario even worse.

I'm one of many Canadians who detest Donald Trump as an uber-egotistical, narcissistic, lying bully with ethical values vastly below those of our Prime Minister. But the stark reality is that virtually all of Justin Trudeau's policies, from energy regulation to tax rates to income and carbon taxes to deficit spending, are economically suicidal in the face of Trump's avowed actions. Clinging to those policies in the face of Trump-quake could prove to be the biggest mistake made by any Prime Minister in Canadian history.

Rosemère reaches agreement with CUPE blue and white collars

Details worked out in 'climate of collaboration,' says Mayor Leduc

On Feb. 15, the Town of Rosemère and the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) local 4756 white and blue collar workers announced they had signed a collective agreement.

2 and 2.3 per cent hikes

At the union's general meeting held on Jan. 9, the majority of salaried employees in attendance voted in favor of the agreement. The renewed collective agreement, which runs until 2019, calls for a 2 per cent increase in salaries for the years 2015 and 2016, and 2.3 per cent for the years 2017, 2018 and 2019.

Modifications were also made to certain clauses, notably those relating to work bonuses and the establishment of a group insurance study committee. Rosemère mayor Madeleine Leduc said she was highly pleased with the renewal of the collective agreement covering the town's blue and white-collar workers.

An equitable agreement: mayor

"Negotiations with the parties involved made it possible to come to an equitable agreement in a climate of collaboration," she said during a press conference held at the public library for the announcement.

"My thanks to all who joined forces to come to an agreement that takes into account the interests of all the parties involved, in a spirit of sound management of the public purse for the benefit of our taxpayers," she added.

CatChat mandated to help control Rosemère's feral cats

Town grants new organization \$10,000 to carry out task

At Rosemère's Feb. 13 town council meeting, the mayor and councillors announced the establishment of Catchat (Cohabitating with your Cat), a new organization whose mission will be to ethically control the town's overpopulation of stray cats.

In support of the initiative, the town has given the organization a \$10,000 grant. This money will cover CatChat's start-up costs as well as the cost of sterilizing cats identified on its territory.

A respectful approach

"I am very pleased to announce the Town of Rosemère's involvement in this project, which constitutes a concrete solution for controlling the feline population on our territory, thanks to an approach that is respectful of the animal," Mayor Madeleine Leduc said during a briefing for the media held at Rosemère's public library.

"As the problem of stray cats has become a general concern, even for neighbouring town, it was necessary for an organization of this type to be established in Rosemère," she added. The Town of Rosemère and a group of citizens worked together to implement a process for the management of feral cats. This citizen-driven initiative gave rise to CatChat.

The organization proposes the TNR (Trap – Neuter – Return to their original location) solution for ensuring the effective management of the feline overpopulation. Cats, once neutered, will be released in their original location to ensure the maintenance of their colonies rather than allow other unsterilized cats to move in.

Ear markings will identify neutered cats to avoid trapping them anew.

A mandate to protect cats

"We are committed to doing whatever is needed to ensure the well-being of the animal, from his trapping to his release, or his adoption when possible," said CatChat's president, Patrick De Geyter. To this end, CatChat signed an agreement with Rosemère's two veterinary clinics, Vraiment bêtes! and Clinique vétérinaire Rosemère. These clinics will work closely with the organization on the sterilization of the trapped cats.

Over the coming months, CatChat will carry out a cat census in order to assess the scope of the situation and plan the resources required for its proper operation. Various communication tools will be used to involve residents in this census of the feline population. In a release to the media, CatChat says its mission is "to help residents control the overpopulation of feral cats in an ethical manner."

A community effort

They say the success of the undertaking rests on the commitment and collaboration of the community, including Rosemère, which provides financial support (neutering of the cats, purchase of equipment, etc.); the Rosemère veterinary partners, which will carry out the neutering; the community, which they hope can help with the trapping of stray cats and their post-operative care; and the expertise of neighboring organizations such as RAA Saint-

Eustache, Boisbriand's Félins parmi nous and Lorraine's Un chat dans ma cour.

An official launch for CatCat will be held on March 13 and operations will start in April. In the interim, they are asking for the help of residents. To obtain an estimate of the feral cat population, they want residents to let them know how many cats there are and where they can be found.

CatChat needs volunteers

In the meantime, they are also seeking

volunteers to help with the following: transport cages to the trapping sites and, subsequently, to the clinics; to ensure post-operative care of neutered cats (changing the litter, feeding, etc.) before they are released; and eventually finding foster families for cats that could possibly be adopted (kittens). Blainville working with Hydro Quebec

on power failures

Uncut trees blamed for local power blackouts in January

(NSN) On Feb. 16, the mayor of Blainville, several city councillors and representatives of the local business community and a citizens group met with senior officials of Hydro Quebec to find out what were the causes of power failures in the area this past January.

Hydro Quebec had been conducting work along certain lines to control the growth of vegetation (BLA248 Curé-Labelle) and GRX254 north of Fontainebleau, Sainte-Thérèse and Jardins de Blainville).

Work stalled last year

'We decided to stop the work that had started in the autumn along the BLA248 and GRX254 lines in order to measure the efficiency, which will be accomplished from now to spring," said Mayor Richard Perreault. "As for the other problem lines, we are waiting for a proposal from Hydro Quebec and we will evaluate the extent of the work and its impact on the citizens. One thing is certain: we are on the right track."

Five representatives from Hydro Quebec attended the meeting, including the vice-president of the distribution network. They gave an account of the work that could not be finished before Christmas as planned, since other work were added to the initial in order to lessen the burden on the network.

Caused by contact with trees

As for the power failures in January, they were caused by contact with vegetation along the network, most notably by trees that were scheduled to be cut and which ended up falling on the lines under the weight of ice from an ice storm. This was the case with one tree which impacted line GRX254 north of Sainte-Thérèse. This was a tree that was targeted, but the owner hadn't authorized Hydro Quebec to cut it.

"It's an example among many others, but it shows that just one refusal can cause power failures for millions of clients," added Perreault. "The cooperation of all citizens, including those from other municipalities, is thus to be hoped for. I am happy that the degree of acceptance in Blainville is regarded as among the highest in

Quebec, according to Hydro Quebec. I thank all Blainville residents who cooperated and also those who will be called upon to cooperate."

Respecting the environment

The City of Blainville says it continues to protect 40 per cent of its territory consisting of natural areas. Several thousand trees were planted in 2016 in order to maintain the forest covering. As well, a recuperation project to recycle and reuse residues from trees is currently underway.

"We will pursue our efforts to preserve and improve our natural spaces, just as we did with the forest at Plan Bouchard and the Fauvel lakes," Perreault continued. "Nonetheless, the need for electricity potentially can impact health, public security and the economy. The work undertaken must lead in the long run to strengthening of the electric network in Blainville. Our administration is determined to reduce the number of power blackouts."




