Questions raised over Place des Jeunes 'petition'

Rosemère town council holds last public meeting of the year

After dealing with two pressing issues – the closing of Rosemère's fire department and the future of the Rosemère Golf Club – over the past year, Rosemère mayor Madeleine Leduc's administration faced another confrontation last week involving the Place des Jeunes youth centre project.

Place des Jeunes survey

During town council's Dec. 12 public meeting, independent town councillor Eric Westram asked Leduc whether she was aware a petition had been circulated among youths at École secondaire Hubert-Maisonneuve who were asked what they thought of a skatepark at Place des Jeunes. The mayor asked Rosemère's director of community services Claude Guérin to answer

According to Guérin, it was more of a survey in which the respondents were asked their opinion. He said the school's principal told him some parents had complained that their children were approached without their consent, when the rules of the school stipulate that intervening with students under 14 isn't allowed.

No other complaints

Guérin said no complaints were received from other schools in the area where the poll was also done, including Rosemère High School. "In the case of the other schools all went well, but in

the case of that school [Hubert-Maisonneuve] something went wrong," he said. "I can tell you that I take part of the responsibility."

Council served a notice of motion last month for a loan by-law to borrow \$717,000 to cover the costs for Place des Jeunes. The project will be located on the site of the town's skatepark near the corner of Grande Côte Rd. and Charbonneau St. Youths from Rosemère from 12 to 20 years old will be using it.

Westram on golf course issue

Regarding the golf course issue, Westram issued a statement last week, saying he pledged to look at the club's financial plan and evaluate all possible options with Rosemerites opinion's respect. This follows the Leduc administration's announcement a few weeks back that the Rosemère Golf Club's request for a re-zoning to build up to six storeys along Labelle Blvd. was rejected.

"I intend to meet the golf club's management as soon as possible to evaluate together all options leading to the possibility of saving this large green area, and allowing the construction of an old age residence allowing our older generation to stay in Rosemère, something the actual Mayor has shown no interest in discussing," said Westram who previously announced he is running for mayor next year.

Community services director Claude Guérin said he took responsibility for how the Place des Jeunes survey was handled

Time to stop feeling sorry for yourself

Victim stories negatively affect us and our attitude towards others and life, yet we all carry them around

s much as we hate to admit it, we've probably all told victim stories. We've certainly had them told to us. It's time to banish them.

The victim story is the one you auto-share that alerts everyone (including yourself) that you've been wronged by someone or some unfair situation. The telling (and retelling) confirms the need to feel hurt, angry, frustrated and resentful. And it justifies our reactions and behaviours.

We can get so attached to these stories that they seem to become our identity - they change us. We become impatient with others and release the demons when we feel we're facing a repeat situation.

But what if the story isn't entirely true?

Sometimes we find ourselves in situations and conflicts that hurt our feelings, but does that really mean we're no good? A victim?

If we tell the stories to ourselves for too long, they become a part of us, not just something that happened a long time ago. This presents a big problem when we finally decide it's time to release that story for good. After all, who would we be without the story?

Most of us would feel liberated if we let that story go. We'd have a profound sense of calm. It might even feel like a huge weight off our shoulders.

These stories are undesirable. They negatively affect us and our attitude towards others and life. They get in the way of having positive experiences and relationships. They crowd out logical thinking.

When we attach ourselves to these beliefs, they obstruct our willingness to resolve an issue, request an apology, seek forgiveness, gain greater communication with others or even feel contentment.

Instead of moving forward and evolving in our relationships, we feel a need to have several people, if not hundreds of people, know that we have been the victim of someone else's bad behaviour. That we were right and they were wrong.

If we tell a victim story long enough, we're unable to let it go until others know what this person or group did to us. If you think anyone has the power to hurt you, you're confused. Harbouring the anger and bitterness only makes us angry and bitter, and it diminishes the quality of our lives.

Any story that blocks our ability to feel joy, reach for opportunities or claim our own power needs to be reassigned (like a challenging employee).

Consider how pervasive a dandelion can be when it's not removed from the yard. It doesn't take long for that weed to spread around and choke out healthy grasses. This is true of toxic stories, too.

So if it's time to pull the proverbial weed from your inner dialogue, consider these few tips to help you discard or abandon the story, and have it transferred to a more capable storyteller.

Since our minds often don't recognize the difference between fantasy and reality, you can get the upper hand by imagining the problem story as a specific individual and then plan a useful meeting with it.

Allow me to illustrate how your meeting could go. You may have heard some of these (in passing of course and not directed at you in any way):

"Seriously, it's not you, it's me."

"I'm simply under qualified to nurture your unique skill sets."

"This position will only continue to limit your growth potential, and that would be tragic given your drive and determination in this field of study."

"In time, you'll come to realize that this was the best decision you ever made."

So if you catch yourself mulling over and over (and over) a victim story that seems to be leaving you a bit unsatisfied ... consider pulling the darn thing out of your conversation loops. Sometimes the story is just not a team player and needs to be left in peace.

If you're not a person of words, just picture the darn thing duct taped, hooded and left in a new location blinking repetitively at the swiftness of its reassignment.

Rosemère tables 2017 budget with zero tax increase

Town to cut \$52 off tax bills, using savings from closed fire dept.

Owners of residential properties in Rosemère worth an average \$416,100 will be receiving a \$52 credit on their 2017 tax bills as one of the results of the savings the town achieved after shutting the fire department permanently this past year.

Infrastructure fund set up

As well, town officials have also decided in the latest budget to use the \$1.175 million saved following the controversial closure to establish a permanent infrastructure renewal fund that will be drawn upon regularly and replenished every year with an equal amount.

Mayor Madeleine Leduc tabled the \$29,364,800 budget at town hall on Nov. 19. It sets out a plan, worked out by a team led largely by Councillor Daniel Simoneau who is town council's finance specialist, in which there are no increases in residential or commercial taxes or in rates paid for services.

"Driven by a commitment to strengthening Rosemère's enviable position with vision, rigour and determination, my administration is pleased with this budget, which carries no tax impact for our citizens," the mayor said in a statement issued to journalists during a briefing before the budget's presentation at town hall later that evening.

Among lowest tax rates

"My administration is especially proud of offering one of the lowest tax rates in the region while providing quality services," added Mayor Leduc. "In the process, we position Rosemère quite positively on the regional and provincial stage."

According to the budget, the residential tax rate will be \$0.5230 per \$100 evaluation, as it was in 2016. The real estate tax rate for merchants and industry will remain at the 2016 level of \$1.5797. This 2017 budget also maintains current rates for water (\$175) and waste pick-ups (\$300 for residential and \$430 for commercial and industrial).

Infrastructure to be upgraded

Town officials say the infrastructure fund is being set up to "ensure the sustainability of Rosemère's infrastructures while reducing the tax burden on future generations." They say it will be used to finance major investments in infrastructure needs, as well as allow Rosemère to consolidate the current generation's gains for the benefit of future residents.

In 2017, Rosemère's administration will be upgrading municipal infrastructures such as the sewer and water systems (\$4 million), as well as roads, curbs and sidewalks (\$860,000). The investments also include improvements in the network of parks and green spaces (\$2.4 million), in particular the development of the Place des jeunes teen centre (\$700,000), and the upgrading of the soccer playing field at Charbonneau Park (\$700,000).

Last budget before election

"This is the fourth budget of our administration's mandate," Leduc pointed out. "As with previous budgets, its development required us to deal with a number of sizeable challenges. It summarizes our approach to its development and will continue to embody our purpose throughout the coming year. We believe that this approach is fully consistent with your expectations of our administration."

According to Leduc, the 2017 budget includes a 0.33% reduction in operating expenses over 2016. She said that maintaining tax rates at the

current level was possible thanks to savings achieved within the framework of the fire safety agreement concluded with Blainville.

"Our efforts to ensure the strict management of public funds also allow us to hold special rates at the current level for 2017. This freeze applies to the water and waste management rates. Moreover, our program to help property owners 67 years of age and over remain in their homes will be renewed in 2017. The amount of the annual grant remains unchanged at \$50."

Three-year capital investments

As well, she said, in 2017 the town, in partnership with the Rosemère business association, will provide the services of a liaison officer who will improve communication and work with local companies. "Our commercial sector's

contribution to the growth of Rosemère is significant," she said.

Regarding the town's three-year capital expenditures plan, she said there will be major investments in Rosemère's drinking water plant in the coming years. The capital expenditures plan also calls for improvements to the town's network of parks and green spaces as well as some municipal buildings.

Average residential taxpayer to be billed \$16.42 more in 2017

City of Deux-Montagnes tables \$26,743,400 annual budget

The owner of a property in the City of Deux-Montagnes worth an average \$238,000 will be receiving a tax bill next year that's 0.59 per cent higher, or \$16.42 more than last year, according to the municipality's 2017 budget.

According to the financial plan tabled by Mayor Denis Martin at city hall on Dec. 12, Deux-Montagnes isn't making provision over the 2017 period for expenses related to the much-discussed indoor pool project to be done in conjunction with Sainte-Marthe-sur-le-Lac.

Infrastructure and debt

"We are projecting that this would be in 2018," a senior finance department official told a resident who was one of the few who turned out for the meeting and asked questions following the presentation of the budget.

Mayor Denis Martin said the city's overall plan is to continue investing in infrastructure, while paying off debt and gradually reducing it "to a more proper balance than what it had been for four or five years. It's important that we keep

the debt in perspective and that we not borrow more than what we make in revenue, but that we maintain our infrastructure."

Assessing the \$26,743,400 budget, the mayor noted that over the previous four years, Deux-Montagnes property owners were subjected to an overall average tax increase of 5.49 per cent. "On the third day after I was elected, I was presented with the 2014 budget in which it was said that taxes absolutely had to go up by 10 per cent or else the city would have serious problems," he said.

Low taxes, low debt

"We didn't want to get involved in that sort of game. We set a tax increase at 1.92 at that moment. We also were determined, thanks to the work of everyone around the table here today, to keep that tax hike the lowest it could

According to director-general Benoit Ferland, Deux-Montagnes had \$990,000 in surplus funds when Denis Martin took office more than three years ago. That sum now totals \$3 million, he added. "This makes the City of Deux-Montagnes's situation stable and solid than it was at our arrival," Martin said. "I can tell you that we're very proud of this budget and of our presentation this evening."

North Shore schools benefit from \$41,000 Laurier Foundation donation

Funding received for academic, sports, wellness, health and tech projects

Christmas came early last week for several elementary and secondary schools in the North Shore and Lower Laurentian regions which are under the umbrella of the Sir Wilfrid Laurier School Board.

As part of an annual tradition, the Sir Wilfrid Laurier Foundation, which raises extra funding for educational projects at the SWLSB, donated almost \$41,000 towards 21 academic, technological, sports, wellness and health school projects on the school board's territory.

A tradition since 2004

Every year since its creation in 2004, the SWLF has funded projects in line with its mission, as well as the strategic plan of the SWLSB and the education projects of its schools.

Members of the board of directors of the SWLF were present at SWLSB headquarters in Rosemère on Wednesday last week for the Council of Commissioners' last public meeting of the year to hand cheques to representatives from the schools.

"I strongly believe that the foundation's success is a direct result of the dedication and passion of the members who sit on the board of directors," said Christian Fréchette, the foundation's president since 2013. "These individuals work hard to raise funds and ensure the foundation's sustainability."

An impressive contribution

We are very thankful to the Foundation for its contribution to our schools' projects that could otherwise not be possible," said Jennifer Maccarone, chairperson of the SWLSB. "Over the past 13 years, the foundation has given almost three quarters of a million dollars to our schools and centres. That's quite impressive. I could not think of a better way to begin the last Council meeting of 2016."

Fréchette extended an open invitation to anyone wishing to join him in his quest for an enriched school environment for SWLSB students. "There is still room for business representation on the board of directors," he said. "We need volunteers, passionate and dynamic individuals with ideas to carry out projects that will all make us proud."

Insecurity being felt in Deux-Montagnes over CDPQ Infra project

Property owners express concerns at December city council meeting

The Caisse de dépôt et de placement du Québec's plans to build an electrified commuter train network through the Montreal region – including a branch that stands to make a major impact in Deux-Montagnes – preoccupied several residents who raised the issue during the Dec. 8 Deux-Montagnes city council meeting.

City seeks level-crossings

In an interview with the North Shore News following the meeting, Mayor Denis Martin said the City of Deux-Montagnes is currently lobbying CDPQ Infra, the subsidiary building the rail line, to have overpasses built at the junctions of streets where there are currently level crossings across the existing AMT railway line.

These include Henri-Dunant St., and possibly also du Lac and Deux-Montagnes boulevards. "If we can, we will try to get overpasses all the way so that no citizen is impacted," he said. The alternative, which CDPQ Infra had been leaning towards, would be to close existing level crossings. While CDPQ has safety reasons in mind, the city is concerned that closing areas of Deux-Montagnes off from each other could cause traffic problems.

"They wanted to shut down Henri-Dunant, but now we're looking into the possibility of keeping it open," said the mayor. "We're in ongoing negotiations. But we cannot forget that CDPQ is a big entity. But we're making progress, although it's a very sensitive file because there are expropriations involved and there are residents who are worried about the impact on where they live."

CDPQ Infra creates uncertainty

During question period, a 16th Ave. resident told the mayor that he came to live in Deux-Montagnes six years ago with every intention of staying permanently, although now he feels threatened because of the uncertainty generated by the impending disruptions caused by CDPQ Infra's project. Among other things, he complained about a lack of information coming from city officials regarding the CDPQ Infra project.

Regarding the issue of possible street closings, the mayor told him: "The city has asked for four crossings and they are going to come back to us with a recommendation. We have done studies on traffic, public security and the impacts. What's sure is that the more we reduce the number of crossings the more it increases traffic problems.

"With more crossings we would have the



Impact could be felt on streets

Later during question period, the mayor told Eric Roberge that it was possible 16th Ave. could become a dead-end as an end result of the CDPQ Infra project. "We've talked about a bicycle path, in which case it would be open for that," he said, while adding that it would also remain open for pedestrians.

Also during question period, Serge Rochette was ejected from the council meeting after making statements to the mayor (without asking a specific question) regarding the mayor's status as a part-time or full-time elected official. According to the regulations for the conduct of municipal council meetings, verbal interventions by residents must be phrased as questions, failing which the intervener can be ruled out of order and removed forcibly if he or she doesn't leave voluntarily.

Duties delegated to DG

Addressing another resident later, the mayor explained how he can split his time between city hall and his other position: "Some people think the mayor is the director-general, but that's not how it works." Comparing city council to the board of directors of a company, he said general orientations for the way the municipality should be run are delegated to the director-general who interfaces with the municipal employees.

In other business, city council decided to

rename a public meeting room at the Maison du Citoyen after two longtime activists in Deux-Montagnes: André and Cécile Ouellet. They have been involved for years in the operation

of the Dépannage Saint-Agapit food bank as



Deux-Montagnes Police arrest four following threats

Polyvalente Deux-Montagnes locked down during incident

(NSN) Four young males suspected of making violent threats against a high school student were arrested at gunpoint near Polyvalente Deux-Montagnes on Tuesday earlier this week by officers from the Deux-Montagnes Regional Police Department.

The suspects, all 19 years of age and from neighbouring Laval, were taken into custody after a student from the school had called the police to report being threatened via social media by the foursome. Some of the social media photos showed at least one of the suspects in possession of firearms.



According to Cst. Christopher Harding of the Deux-Montagnes Regional Police, the school was placed in a lockdown status at mid-day and 2,000 or so students inside couldn't leave until the situation had been clarified. (NSN) On Dec. 14, the Deux-Montagnes Regional Police Department conducted simultaneous raids on suspected marijuana production facilities at three residences located in Sainte-Marthe-sur-le-Lac and Saint-Josephdu-Lac. The raids resulted in the arrest of four

According to the police, the raids were the culmination of several months of investigation based on tips received from the public. Twenty or so police officers involved in the operation seized equipment used in the production of marijuana as well as 400 plants of the substance.

The suspects were scheduled to be arraigned at the courthouse in Saint-Jérôme on several charges, including marijuana production, possession of narcotics for the purpose of trafficking and theft of electricity.


