

Starting July 18 wearing a face covering in public is mandatory

Fines for businesses and individuals

Masks or face coverings will be mandatory in all indoor public spaces across Quebec, beginning Saturday, July 18.

That coincides with the start of the province's two-week construction holiday, when tens of thousands of Quebecers take their summer

"It's not fun wearing a mask, but it's essential. It's better to wear a mask than to be confined at home," said Premier François Legault in making the announcement last Monday

The regulation applies to everyone age 12 and up, although Legault said even children as young as two could be encouraged to wear a mask. People with a medical condition that precludes them from wearing one will be

Hefty fines for all

Legault said the government took time before making masks mandatory to get people used to the two-metre distancing rule, which he said is the most important one to follow.

The indoor mask regulation will apply to retail stores, malls and recreational centres and any other enclosed public space, including restaurants, whenever someone is not seated at a table.

To start, only businesses will face fines. Business owners are responsible for applying the new regulations. If they fail to, they could face fines of between \$400 and \$6,000.

As of Aug. 1, individuals who refuse to wear masks could also face fines. For now, that won't happen, but people without masks could be denied entry to indoor establishments.

Dr. Karl Weiss, a microbiologist and the head of infectious diseases at Montreal's Jewish General Hospital, said wearing a mask is a temporary measure that has to become as much of a habit as stopping for a red light.

Weiss said several studies have proven the effectiveness of using a mask to limit the spread of coronavirus micro-droplets.

Financial impact worries businesses

Business (CFIB) said although its members understand that asking customers to wear masks is important to contain the spread of COVID-19, they are concerned about the cost.

"Only 20 per cent of Quebec businesses are earning their usual income for this time of year," said the CFIB. "Many cannot afford to lose customers and will bear the additional costs of purchasing personal protective equipment

The federation is asking for financial assistance to purchase PPE for workers.

The last thing Quebec's merchants want is to close up shop because of an outbreak of COVID-19, said Stéphane Drouin of the Quebec

For Étienne Cummings, director of public relations and government affairs for Quebec City's chamber of commerce, the new regulation was a logical next step, although it will not be easy for merchants to turn away customers who refuse to wear mask.

He said he hopes the new rule won't discourage Quebecers from continuing to support local

When wear a mask or a face covering

Wearing a mask or face covering that covers the nose and mouth will also be mandatory in enclosed or partially enclosed public places from July 18, 2020 for people age 12 and over.

This obligation, with exceptions, will apply in particular in the following places:

- •a retail business;
- •a service company (e.g., pharmacies);
- •a professional's private office;
- •a place where municipal or government services are offered;
- •a personal care business (e.g., hairdressers, beauty care);
 - •a shopping mall;
 - •a place of worship;
- •a place where cultural or entertainment activities or services are offered (e.g., movie theatre, concert hall, museum, etc.);
- •a rental room or other venue used to host events, such as conferences and conventions;
- •a place where sports or recreational activities are practiced;
- •a restaurant or bar;
- •a common area, including an elevator, of a tourist accommodation establishment;

educational institution (except pre-school, primary and secondary schools), including colleges and universities;

•a train or bus station, a river station, a metro station or an airport.

Wearing a mask or face covering will also be mandatory to access or move around a lobby, reception area or elevator in an office building othen than an apartment building.

Children under 12 years of age, people whose particular medical condition prevents them from wearing a mask and people who are unable to put on or take off a mask by themselves do not have to wear a face covering. However, for children between 2 and 12 years of age, wearing a face covering or mask is recommended.

Masks and face covering with a clear window

People who work in customer service are being asked to wear a face covering that has a clear window in order to promote communication with hearing impaired people, people learning the language, people with intellectual disabilities, an autism spectrum disorder or a cognitive impairment, for example.

Workers will be allowed to return to their offices as of Saturday, with restrictions...

Starting Saturday, employers in Quebec can Labour Minister Jean Boulet explained during start calling their employees back to the workplace, as long as the office is filled at no more than 25 per cent capacity.

Employees who need to carry out certain activities in person, or who are having trouble working from home because of family obligations, should have priority in returning to work,

a news conference Wednesday.

But, he said, a work-from-home policy is still strongly recommended.

Quebec's workplace health and safety board (CNESST) has created awareness raising tools and training to ensure people returning to the workplace can do so safely.

Those who are back at work will have to wear

a face covering in all common areas, especially places like elevators or entrance halls where physical distancing is not possible.

Employers will also have a duty to make sure that their workplaces will be safe and comply with guidelines from public health, which includes asking employees if they have been exposed to COVID-19, or been in a place, like a bar, where they could have been exposed.

"It's also a question of economic vitality," said Boulet, pointing out that having so many people working from home has reduced economic activity in downtown Montreal.

Having more workers in offices should help restaurants and businesses, said Chantal Rouleau, the provincial minister responsible for Montreal.

Why some people are immune from scandal – until they're not

candals are violent shocks to social systems in which public figures may fall from grace. Societies have long been captivated by scandals embroiling powerful people.

Film producer Harvey Weinstein and financier Jeffrey Epstein come easily to mind, as does American actor Johnny Depp, whose libel case against a U.K. tabloid has attracted significant attention.

Politicians also populate this list, including failed Paris mayoral candidate Benjamin Griveaux, former U.S. senator Larry Craig and former Italian prime minister Silvio Berlusconi, now member of the European Parliament despite an endless list of scandals.

Yet not all scandalous acts result in a scandal or produce the same consequences. How can we explain the fact that some prominent figures seem able to resist the consequences of their behaviour and to be seemingly immune from scandals?

The traditional view on scandals in social science, the "objectivist" perspective, holds that there is a direct, linear relationship between the severity of behaviour in question and its social consequences. To casual observers as well, scandals are usually perceived as naturally resulting from severe transgressions: Where there's smoke, there's fire.

In contrast, a more recent "constructivist" perspective sees scandals as social-cultural events driven in large part by media reporting. Here, misconduct is neither necessary nor sufficient for a scandal to occur: some scandals result from rumours, while much bad behaviour never gets activated into scandal.

It's not the act itself, therefore, but rather the

media that distinguishes transgressions that remain private from those that make a stir.

As the fourth estate, the media publicize salient behaviour, activating public opinion and disapproval. Media attention problematizes the behaviour in question, pressuring other institutions to react. Media coverage also ensures that the reputations of scandal protagonists are assailed, leading to potential stigmatization. No media, no scandal.

Why then do some seem immune from scandal?

We take a constructivist perspective on what drives media reporting and the consequences of this attention. We outline five factors that influence how scandals get activated, which in turn explains why some figures fall from grace while others remain untouched.

First, the media are more likely to create a scandal when transgressions disrupt established norms. When public figures who hold themselves up as paragons of morality are revealed to violate the social order they purport to uphold, a scandal is sure to follow.

In 2007, conservative U.S. senator Craig was arrested for lewd conduct in a Minneapolis airport bathroom. He subsequently pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct and resigned. It was not his behaviour per se, but the inconsistencies with social rules he openly supported that the media problematized.

Even figures whose appeal lies in their ability to flout norms - like Berlusconi - will find themselves enmeshed in scandal when they broach norms that affect their supporters personally and negatively.

Second, media coverage of wrongdoing only activates a scandal when it speaks to powerful and interested social groups. Audiences are not homogeneous: what is egregiously offensive to some is unremarkable to others. Those who operate at the intersection of multiple, diverse interest groups may seem immune from scandal because only some constituencies find a particular behaviour objectionable. A scandal is only likely to emerge if the most powerful audiences are willing to act upon the transgression.

Consider a political figure, like presumptive U.S. Democratic presidential nominee Joe Biden, who was accused by conservative politicians and media outlets of securing seats on the boards of international firms for his son Hunter. However, the intelligence community, Democratic party, mainstream media and especially voters did not agree, and the issue fizzled. Heinz-Christian Strache, Austria's onetime

vice-chancellor and head of the Freedom Party (FPÖ), didn't receive similar support in May 2019 when a video was released of him proposing to offer government contracts to the supposed niece of a Russian oligarch. In the ensuing corruption scandal, he was forced to resign, new elections were held and the support for the far-right FPÖ collapsed.

Third, the relative status and credibility of a media outlet also impact attempts to publicize scandalous behaviour. The media not only publicize transgressions but also shape scandal narratives. Attempts to delegitimize the media (for example, by calling them "fake news") may help transgressors reduce the impact of their wrongdoing. Both Donald Trump and Berlusconi regularly attack the media (an irony in Berlusconi's case, given his media-driven fortune).

Not all outlets enjoy equal reach or credibility: scandals typically emerge from the most prestigious outlets. While public shaming is common on social media, it typically damages individual reputations without rising to the level of scandal unless picked up by more prestigious outlets.

This may be changing given shifting news consumption patterns. On social media it's easier to target different groups with specific information, as proved by the Cambridge Analytica scandal. Even when a scandal erupts, the balkanization of the media implies that different groups may receive contrasting framings, reducing the impact of the scandal on the transgressor.

Fourth, whether the media are attentive to a transgressor, and whether that transgression leads to scandal, is in part a function of who the transgressors are. Some public figures are protected from scandals by the halo effect that emanates from previously held public opinion – a strong reputation, high status or celebrity can immunize transgressors from what would normally be negative outcomes that might stem from discreditable behaviour.

When audiences are emotionally attached to, preoccupied with, or revere a public figure - as pop music fans were of Michael Jackson during his lifetime, for example - positive feelings prevent them from rationally evaluating evidence. By choosing to overlook questionable actions, they're able to avoid engaging in the difficult sense-making process that would force them to challenge their prior feelings.

Finally, both the media and the public are subject to scandal fatigue when too many scandals appear one after another.

Cultural sociologist Mark Jacobs has theorized about a "system of scandals," whereby the over-reporting of scandal by the media can potentially normalize it. As Jacobs writes, "scandals germinate in fields of secrecy and corruption," but too many scandals can exhaust audiences and their moral appetite for punishing potential wrongdoers. The current U.S. president comes notably to mind.


The fact remains that some public figures are able to resist creating a scandal better than others. Political figures have status, authority and legitimacy that can protect them, but also visibility that can pull them down.

Corporate leaders answer to a different set of stakeholders but the activation and fallout from corporate scandals are similar to those in politics, as shown by the differing treatment of business leaders in the LIBOR scandal.

The constructivist perspective provides some explanation by exploring how the interaction of the media with multiple audiences can construct scandals. Over time, conditions may change: audiences may withdraw their support; societal norms evolve under the influence of previous scandals; the credibility, reputation, and status of public figures and organizations

The process of scandal construction is constantly in flux, and that too helps explains why some individuals are immune from scandals, until they are not. The Conversation

Deux-Montagnes council meeting

Debt Load cut by 60% in Just Five Years

The City of Deux-Montagnes during its monthly council meeting on Thursday July 9th filed its consolidated financial statements. While the city's sound financial health was evident, the highlight was the 60% reduction in its net debt in just five years. Consolidated net debt decreased from \$44.5 million in 2014 to \$18.3 million in 2019.

An impressive reduction in the debt load can only be achieved by the sound management of public funds under the city's administration and confirm its strong capacity to develop in a responsible manner, while offering diverse and quality services to the city's residents.

"Our financial performance demonstrates a great deal of discipline on the part of elected municipal officials. City managers also play a key role in achieving organizational and financial goals. I would like to personally thank them," said the mayor of Deux-Montagnes, Denis Martin. "This good management of finances also makes it possible to react to unforeseen events, such as the spring flood that occurred in 2019, without jeopardizing the budgetary future of the City," added the Mayor.

A positive balance sheet

The City ended 2019 with an operating surplus of \$1.6 million, which represents 5.7% of the original budget. This good performance is due to an increase in revenues of more than \$1 million and a decrease of \$0.6 million in expenses and other tax items.

Among the investments of \$5.1 million made in 2019, more than \$4.5 million was allocated to urban infrastructure (permanent dyke, sewer and aqueduct network, Armitage park) and for the upgrading/enlarging of the fire station. For these investments, subsidies have been recorded



for an amount of \$ 2,774,000 : \$ 1,407,000 for the permanent dyke and \$ 1,366,600 for the fire station

The passionate and energetic work of the municipal administration and the support of all the actors involved contributed to making

Deux-Montagnes a city where life is good and where people thrive. This kind of positive energy will be all the more essential in the months to come, as the city closely monitors the effects of COVID-19 on public finances.

The city of Deux-Montagnes, taking very seriously its duty towards the citizens providing a healthy and green environment has taken measures to protect it.

In the wake of work to restore Boulevard Deux-Montagnes, the 29 trees that were in the median of this main artery has all been preserved and replanted in two City parks (Mikaël Kingsbury Park and Louis-Warren Park). In addition to this action to protect the city's forest heritage, three times the number of trees will be planted along Boulevard Deux-Montagnes at the end of the work, scheduled for mid-September.

More specifically, the City of Deux-Montagnes

will plant, next fall, 90 large-caliber trees (already large in size) on the boulevard Deux-Montagnes, between the railway and the boundaries of Saint-Eustache. The tree species that will enhance the city's environment have also been selected for their good resistance to urban conditions, in particular their tolerance to de-icing salts.

With the heart of protecting, conserving and developing its urban forest heritage, the City of Deux-Montagnes also adopted its first tree policy last June. The latter aims to frame various actions concerning the trees that are found on its territory. It can be viewed on the City's website.

Rinsing of fire hydrants in Deux-Montagnes

The City of Deux-Montagnes will conduct the annual inspection of fire hydrants from July 13 to 27, 2020. The work, which was to initially starting on June 23, had to be postponed by the contractor.

The rinsing work will be carried out Monday to Thursday, between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. In addition to ensuring the proper functioning of fire hydrants, this operation is essential to maintaining the quality of the drinking water distribution network. It allows to evacuate the particles which have formed on the walls of the water mains and to detect possible leaks.

The detachment of iron particles in the water pipes may cause cloudy water and reddish coloring. It is recommended to run cold water for a few minutes, until the water returns to its normal appearance.

Colored water can be consumed and therefore poses no health risk.

Before using household appliances, such as a washing machine or dishwasher, you must first make sure that the water is colorless to avoid soiling clothes or dishes.

The #StopHateforProfit campaign was launched on June 19 following the death of George Floyd and the worldwide protests. The initiators of this campaign—the Anti-



Defamation League, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and other organizations-are asking major advertisers to stop advertising on Facebook and Instagram for one month. Many large corporations have joined in, in an effort to convince Facebook and other online social platforms to crack down on hate and racist groups.

Individuals who would have successfully infiltrated corporate email boxes and then defrauded companies of several hundred thousand dollars were the target of a major police operation on Tuesday north of Montreal.

Four searches were underway at the end of the morning in three residences in Laval, as well as a business in Rosemère.

According to the authorities, several people who may be involved in the fraudulent scheme have been arrested.

"Specifically, between May 12 and June 4, 2020, the suspects allegedly managed to infiltrate

merchant mailboxes and divert payments, via fraudulent messages, to new accounts," said the Sûreté du Québec (SQ) in a press release.

'We encourage merchants to check and strengthen their IT security system if necessary and to agree to more than one verification with their customers, ideally verbally, when it comes to making a change of account, or a transfer for a payment," added the SQ.

The operation was led by the SQ's major crimes investigators, in collaboration with the police from Mascouche and Terrebonne.

Rosemère lifts watering ban

The Town of Rosemère lifted on July 7th the watering ban notice that had been in effect since June 18. However, the Town is asking citizens to be careful with their drinking water consumption and to respect the watering by-laws in force.

« We thank our citizens for the respect of the ban over the past week. In this regard, if we observe resurgence in water consumption, we will be forced to re-issue a complete watering ban. We ask you, as responsible citizens, to use drinking water responsibly with the ultimate goal of ensuring fire safety on our territory at all times in case of emergency », stated Rosemère Mayor Eric Westram.

Citizens can therefore resume their activities. such as washing cars and watering the lawn, in accordance with the watering bylaw in force. Residents who do not comply with the bylaw are liable to a fine of up to \$2,000.

The Gouvernement du Québec is assessing the possibility of providing a mobile application for intelligent phones, that could be used to inform users if they are exposed to the virus.

Objectives of the application:

It would be up to each citizen to decide whether to install the application. It would also be possible to deactivate it at any time, or to completely erase it.

This consultation will make it possible to inform the population and gauge their interest in such an application, and to properly identify their concerns.





Firepits on the sights of Saint Eustache

The dangers of a beloved summer pastime

It is a very common sight! Families gathered around an open fire inside a metal firepit. Marshmallow roasting, stories and laughter, sparks ascending in the summer twilight and a feeling of camping in the wild transported right in one's backyard.

Yet for all their cozy feelings, firepits are becoming more and more the target of strict city laws, limiting them or outright prohibiting them. The climate is getting warmer and the dangers of forest fires are increased, neighbors are disturbed breathing in someone else's smoke since there is no chimney to lift high up and new studies alert for the dangers of chemicals inhaled and the problems they can cause to our lungs.

Know Your Risk: Fire Pit Burning

Fire pit burning in both urban and rural areas creates smoke that contains many pollutants and irritants which can cause or aggravate lung health problems as well as negatively impact air quality. Environment Canada and Health Canada have identified many hazardous chemical substances in wood smoke, including:

PM10 (inhalable particulate matter less than 10 microns in diameter) consists of a mixture of microscopic particles of varied size and composition, and has been declared a toxic substance under the Environmental Protection Act. These particles can be inhaled deep into the lungs, leading to serious respiratory problems especially among those with pre-existing cardiopulmonary illness.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) can reduce the blood's ability to supply necessary oxygen to the body's tissues, which can cause stress to the heart. When inhaled at higher levels, CO may cause fatigue, headaches, dizziness, nausea, confusion and disorientation and, at very high levels, can lead to unconsciousness and death. Fire Prevention Canada advises that CO detectors be installed in every home that has a combustion appliance or an attached garage as CO is a colourless, odourless and tasteless gas.

Oxides of Nitrogen (NOx) can lower the resistance to lung infections. In particular, nitrogen dioxide can cause shortness of breath and irritate the upper airways, especially in people with lung diseases such as emphysema and asthma. Volatile organic compounds (VOCs) can cause

respiratory irritation, loss of coordination and illness. Some VOCs emitted by wood-burning appliances, such as benzene, are known to be carcinogenic.

Formaldehyde can cause coughing, headaches and eye irritation and act as a trigger for people with asthma

Polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) are a group of chemicals produced from the uncontrolled burning of carbon-containing materials. Prolonged exposure to PAHs is believed to pose a cancer risk.

Dioxins and furans are highly toxic and can pose health risks even at low exposure levels. Exposure of these chemicals has been linked to cancer and developmental disorders.

Acrolein can cause eye and respiratory tract irritation.

Permits required in Boisbriand

Ever since the ban of fireplaces and wood ovens in Montreal, more and more cities are limiting solid fuel burning. Even the cities that allow firepits clearly state that a firepit is allowed only if the neighboors are not bothered by it. For example, in Boisbriand it is forbidden to make a fire outdoors without a permit issued by the Fire Safety Service after verification of the premises. The authorities may restrict or refuse this type of permit if the weather conditions do not allow it, if the conditions indicated on the permit are not respected or if the danger has increased. It is also forbidden to make a fire outside on days when the speed of the sale exceeds 20 km / h. There must be constant and adequate supervision by an adult responsible person during the outdoor fire. The person responsible must be able to decide on the measures and actions to take to maintain control and to extinguish it. Also the permit does not release the person who obtained it in the event of a complaint or a nuisance with regard to the environment and the neighborhood. In this situation, the burning is automatically suspended.

Saint-Eustache bans them

In Saint-Eustache the municipal by-law concerning public peace, good order and certain nuisance (RM 1776) prohibits open fires (that is to say outdoors) at all times in urban areas.

It is prohibited to cause pollution by the emission of smoke, soot, carbuncles or harmful gases, regardless of whether an installation complies with municipal by-laws.

However, it is permitted to prepare meals on an open fire using an outdoor fireplace, the installation of which complies in all respects

(design, height, etc.) with the zoning by- law RM 1675, subsection 6.2. 8.

On top of the ban mobilization of the Fire Safety Service teams involve costs for the municipality and taxpayers and the city wants to prioritize them for real emergencies.

The city of Saint Eustache warns that failure

to comply with municipal regulations in force, may result to a fine.

The warm feelings that an open fire brings us have to now be replaced by a sense of responsibility for our fellow humans and the environment we all live in.

Sainte-Thérèse takes steps to thwart vandalism at the Le Boisé community garden

Last summer, the Le Boisé community garden, located at the corner of Saint-Pierre and Éloi-Filion streets, experienced its greatest great wave of theft and vandalism since its creation, more than twenty years ago. To meet this challenge, the City of Sainte-Thérèse will put in place a series of dissuasive measures.

The majority of vandals operated at night in places that are less well-lit and where there is little traffic. To alleviate this scourge, the City of Sainte-Thérèse will raise the height of the fence from 4 feet to 8 feet on all four sides of the site and will add a high-performance light powered by a solar panel that will detect movement.

The municipality's investment in securing the premises will amount to a total of \$ 15,000.

"The situation at the Le Boisé community garden is deplorable. Gardeners invest money, but also a lot of time to maintain their garden and provide the care required to ensure the development of their plants. This is why the City of Sainte-Thérèse will intervene in order to dissuade vandals from taking such action," said the mayor of Sainte-Thérèse, Mrs. Sylvie Surprenant.

In a spirit of collaboration, citizens who witness acts of vandalism are encouraged to report them to the Régie intermunicipale de police Thérèse-De Blainville.

The Baking Soprano

Moussaka? Did you say, Moussaka? Ok it's not the exact words from the Academy Award winning movie Zorba the Greek, one of the most memorable scenes from the movie, (Dance? Did you say Dance?) I do get excited with this dish, and so did Zorba when Basil, asks him to teach him to dance. This is one of the most traditional dishes in Greece and was made famous by the French-trained Greek Chef, Nikólaos Tselementés. I grew up with his cook book, and which Greek household didn't own his culinary book? There are many versions and of course other countries that do this recipe, but my favourite one is the one I'm going to share with you, my mother's. Straight from her Tselementes cookbook! This is a classic recipe that has three layers. They are separately cooked before being combined for the final baking: a bottom layer of sliced potatoes and zucchini, topped with a layer of meat sauce (lightly cooked with chopped or puréed tomatoes, onion, garlic, and spices (cinnamon, allspice and black pepper)then sliced eggplant sautéed in olive oil; topped with another layer of the meat sauce, another layer of the sliced eggplant and a final top layer of Béchamel sauce

Famous Greek moussaka INGREDIENTS:

Vegetables

- 3 potatoes
- 5-6 tablespoon(s) olive oil
- 2 large zucchinis, medium
- 2 large eggplants
- salt
- pepper

meat sauce

- 1 onion
- 2 tablespoon(s) olive oil, for sautéing
- 1 clove(s) of garlic
- 3 pinches granulated sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon(s) nutmeg
- 1 level teaspoon(s) cinnamon
- 1 tablespoon(s) tomato paste
- 500 g ground beef
- 400 g canned tomatoes salt
- pepper

Béchamel sauce

- 100 g butter
- 100 g all-purpose flour
- 750 ml milk, 3,5%
- pepper, ground
- 1 pinch nutmeg, ground
- 100 g parmesan cheese, grated
- 3 egg yolks

INSTRUCTIONS

Vegetables

- Peel the potatoes and slice them into thin rounds. Fry in a little olive oil
- Slice the eggplants and zucchini into thin rounds and fry in a separate pan for
- Remove with a slotted spoon and transfer to a baking pan lined with paper towels to absorb the extra grease

Meat sauce


- Sauté the chopped the onion and add to pan.
- Finely chop the garlic and Sauté for 2-3 minutes until they caramelize nicely.
- Add the ground meat and Sauté until golden brown.
- \bullet $\,$ $\,$ Add the tomato paste and chopped tomatoes and simmer for 5-10 minutes until the sauce thickens.
- Add the sugar and spices
- Season with salt and pepper. You can add fresh herbs like parsley or basil

Béchamel sauce

- Place a pot over medium heat.
- Add the butter and let it melt.
- Add the flour and whisk until it soaks up all of the butter.
- \bullet $\,$ $\,$ Add the milk in small batches while continuously whisking so that no lumps form.
- \bullet $\,$ $\,$ As soon as the béchamel sauce thickens and bubbles start to form on the surface, remove from heat.
- Add the nutmeg, salt, pepper, 100 g parmes an and 3 egg yolks. Whisk thoroughly

To assemble

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees F
- In a 10x12 inch baking pan, spread a layer of the bechamel sauce (gives it a foundation) and layer the potatoes with the zucchini.
- Add some of the meat sauce
- Add some bechamel sauce
- \bullet $\,$ $\,$ Layer the sliced eggplant and add cover with more meat sauce. Repeat the same step
- \bullet $\,$ $\,$ Add final layer with bechamel sauce on top of the eggplant and sprinkle grated Parmesan
- Bake for 35-40 minutes.
- When ready, remove from oven and allow to cool before cutting.


