Covid scare at Polyvalente Deux-Montagnes High School

Students in 4th and 5th of the polyvalente Deux-Montagnes High School, in the Laurentians, were on forced vacation from their second day of school. About twenty teachers were placed in preventative isolation as 4 teachers tested positive for the virus.

The parents were informed in the evening, Thursday the 27th of August. "It is with transparency that I inform you that several 4th and 5th secondary teachers will have to be in preventative isolation from tomorrow, Friday August 28, until Friday September 4 inclusively", according to a message sent by the principal, Michel Perron.

These teachers are at "moderate risk" of contracting COVID-19 "because they have been in close contact with an infected person". "This situation remains under control," according to the administration.

The situation worries teachers in the region.

This use of substitutes also raises several concerns, especially when they have to provide replacements in different schools.

"It is sure that for our occasional substitutes it is worrying. They go from class to class, they go from school to school. So, we don't want to relive what was experienced in a CHSLD by walking from one place to another," admits Ms. Bouyer.

The public health department is continuing its

epidemiological investigation. With these two new cases, she extended the teachers' isolation until September 10.

According to the organization, the risk of having contracted COVID-19 is low for most students. There are, however, a few for whom the risk is moderate. These were also isolated as a preventive measure.

The School Service Center and the CISSS des Laurentides assured the public that they continue to monitor the situation closely. Classes are continuing as usual for students in Secondary 1st,2nd and 3d. More than twenty teachers are in preventative isolation. The Deux-Montagnes high school accommodates 1,700 students.

Canada must re-establish itself as an energy superpower While the Americans were acting in their own economic self-interest,

our leaders were undermining our national energy interests

Canada needs renewed federal leadership to support our energy sector, given its importance to the entire economy.

And all provinces and territories must come together in this effort. If not, Canada will continue to see the sector fall behind the United States and other larger powers. We will lose our traditional position as a strong

market-based global energy power. Despite the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on global oil prices, Canada continues to be the largest energy partner to the United States, and yet we lag behind our southern neighbour in terms of achieving energy security for our domestic market.

Canada has the world's third-largest reserve of oil and we're the fifth-largest producer of natural gas. However, this isn't relevant if governments squander that untapped wealth or sell it for sub-optimal prices. Canada has traditionally sold its crude oil to the U.S. at prices below what the broader international market paid.

Canada is falling behind the U.S. in terms of productive energy policy, losing much ground when it comes to oil and gas development. By policy design, the U.S. has gone from being Canada's largest customer for crude oil and natural gas to its largest competitor.

In the U.S., the owner of the land owns the hydrocarbons underneath property. In Canada and most other jurisdictions, the government owns subsurface mineral rights. The U.S. also has a vast infrastructure network that can handle an expanding energy sector.

Prime Minister Justin Trudeau has assured us that critical pipeline projects will proceed but the actions of his government tell a different story.

The Liberal government introduced Bill C-48, which imposed a moratorium on oil tanker traffic on British Columbia's northern coast. The bill killed any hopes for pipeline projects that sought to move Alberta's land-locked crude oil to the Pacific coast through one port.

Then the government introduced Bill C-69, which was intended to streamline the assessment process for projects but ended up creating less clarity and more potential for legal mischief.

The federal government also gave a tepid response when Alberta and British Columbia began an inter-provincial war of words over certain pipeline projects. The government allowed Bill S-245, designed to assert federal authority over inter-provincial pipelines, to die at second reading in the House of Commons.

The government also didn't intervene when the premier of Quebec said no pipeline would pass through his province.

Since 2010, the United States had built the equivalent of 10 Keystone XL

pipelines. According to the U.S.-based Association of Oil Pipe Lines (AOPL), between 2009 and 2013, almost 13,000 km of oil transmission pipelines were built in the United States.

The U.S. has also relaxed offshore drilling regulations to ramp up production. Particularly under President Donald Trump, there has been an explosion in natural gas development in the U.S. His administration opened up large tracts of federal lands to energy development and has been instrumental in the shale gas revolution that expanded oil and gas reserves in the U.S., leading the country toward energy independence.

The administration also changed regulations allowing for natural gas development through hydraulic fracturing (or fracking). The Department of the Interior also worked on allowing Native American communities to better utilize energy resources on tribal lands, to the benefit of those impoverished communities.

The United States has emerged as an energy superpower while Canada has become an energy laggard and investment has fled.

The Trump administration ramped up oil and gas exploration by changing royalty rates for oil and gas leases on federal lands, as well as changing water regulations for fracking on federal and tribal Indian lands. The Department of the Interior also accelerated the pace of offshore oil auctions and reduced royalty rates so more energy companies could enter the market.

Meanwhile, Quebec and some Maritime provinces imposed moratoriums on fracking activities, despite the existence of vast untapped natural gas reserves, especially in New Brunswick.

It wouldn't hurt if the federal government encouraged provinces to accept some fracking.

While some of the energy explosion in the U.S. can be explained by better technologies and methods, much can be attributed to regulatory and policy changes, as well as transformational leadership.

While Canada was listening closely to environmental interests and adopting a weak federal response to energy development, the U.S. was busy adopting winning policies and asserting a lead federal role in pursuing energy development, for both economic and foreign policy reasons.

Canada need not adopt a Trump-style "Canada First" policy. Canadians in all regions value strong environmental regulation and wish to protect wildlife habitats. We already have global-best environmental rules and technologies.

Canada needs a much more balanced approach that recognizes our desire to remain an energy superpower, with made-in-Canada policies that respect $\,$ both the environment and the new energy economy within a free market.

Hasidic community court victory against Boisbriand-The city reacts

The Hasidic Jewish community Kiryas Tosh of Boisbriand has won a victory in court against the City. The dispute concerned taxes the city wanted to impose on certain buildings in the segregated community.

The lawsuit concerned schools for girls and boys in the community and lawyers for the Kiryas Tosh succeeded in demonstrating before the Court of Quebec that these buildings should be exempt from taxes given their religious nature. In these schools, only religious education is given. Secular education is done at home.

This means that the community will not have to pay millions of dollars in taxes to the City of Boisbriand on the few buildings concerned, namely religious schools, synagogues in these schools and davcare centers.

The city is actively pursuing the matter since the girls school could represent \$ 60,000 in taxes, while the boys school, almost \$ 30,000.

The Hasidic Religious Community Center is the appellant because it is the owner of all the buildings in dispute, except the house of the Chief Rabbi, which will not benefit from a tax exemption.

The Hasidic Religious Community Center has only one activity and that is the ownership of the buildings These buildings having no other interest or use, no utility and no other vocation than religious is sufficient. The Court therefore holds that the TAQ (Administrative Tribunal of Quebec) erred in law by failing to recognize the exemption as a religious institution", reads

The mayoress of Boisbriand, Marlene Cordato said she was "totally" surprised by the decision since "the first judgment of the Administrative Tribunal of Quebec was in favor of the City of Boisbriand".

'The Corporation which owns the buildings is a real estate holding company, so it has no activity of a religious nature, and this is what our argument was based on", underlined Cordato.

The community of around 3,000 people did not want to react to the decision.

The City is considering requesting a judicial review

The City of Boisbriand, however, is currently studying the possibility of requesting a judicial review of the judgment rendered by the Court of Quebec in the litigation concerning the property assessment of a few buildings located in the Hasidic Jewish community.

"We believe that this decision will have impacts not only in Boisbriand, but also on all the cities of Quebec," laments Mayor Marlene Cordato.

The City of Boisbriand maintains that the activities of the real estate holding company holding the buildings concerned are not of a religious nature. Consequently, the City considers that it should not benefit from the exemption from taxes which apply to religious institutions.

Kiryas Tosh

Kiryas Tosh, or Kiryas Tash (English: Town of Tash), is named after the town of Tash, Hungary (now Nyirtass, Hungary), near the Czech border, where Tasher (Tosher) rebbes once gathered.

The community was formed in 1963 by Rebbe Meshulim Feish (Ferencz) Lowy. Lowy moved to Montreal in 1951, but viewed the moral climate in the community as deteriorating, and not conducive to the study of Torah. The Rabbi and 18 families moved to Boisbriand in 1963, in an attempt to better insulate and isolate the community from outside influences. Since then, the population of the community has greatly



increased, mostly due to the high fertility rates of Hasidic communities.

In 2019, a mass vaccination campaign against measles was carried out, after a measles outbreak occurred, suspected to have been carried from the endemic measles persistent hotspot in New York City. Most members of the community had already had vaccinations, but not all, and not all up to date in booster shots. Vaccination levels show that anti-vaxxer sentiment is not afflicting the community.

At the end of March 2020, the community was

placed under quarantine after an outbreak of Coronavirus disease 2019, making it a hotspot in the COVID-19 pandemic. It is thought that members of the community who traveled to New York City for a Purim religious celebration in early March became infected with Severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2.

Previous court adventures

In 2014 the Kirvas Tosh community was ordered to pay an accumulated \$2.6 million in water taxes. The Quebec Court of Appeal ruled after hearing the group's contestation of the overdue municipal bill. The community had not paid water taxes since 2005. The Court of Appeal also ordered the community to pay the town's legal costs. The Tasher Congregation and nine other affiliated legal entities were named in the decision. The Tash community has its own private aqueduct serving part of its enclave. The dispute was over the potable water it receives from the public system. The community was claiming Boisbriand was not honouring a 1990 agreement that water meters would be installed on each of the residential and communal buildings. Instead, they maintained, a single meter was installed for all buildings at the enclave's entrance, and consumption is not being calculated accurately.

In February 2020 Yochonon Lowen and Clara Wasserstein, now adults, went to Superior Court in order to request a declaratory judgment against the government of Quebec, which they accused of not having provided them with an adequate education, as stipulated by law on public education. Their lawyer told the court that the two young people received virtually no secular education while attending the private religious school run by the Kiryas Tosh community.

According to court documents, the two young people were educated in Yiddish at a religious school that did not hold a license. They never took a single course in history, geography, science or the arts; Mr. Lowen has never even taken a single French course.

Court documents indicate that neither Mr. Lowen nor Ms. Wasserstein were prepared to integrate into Quebec society when they left the Hasidic community in 2010; they have also had great difficulty in finding work without a primary or secondary education qualification.

The government lawyers and those in the Tash community argued that these issues had since been resolved arguing that Tash complied with the law, which had been tightened, and with the agreements with school boards that allowed Hasidic families to enroll in the "education at school" regime

Saint-Eustache Hospital is building a short-term mental health hospitalization

The modernization project of the Saint-Eustache Hospital is continuing and work is currently underway, in order to expand and fit, among other things, a short-term mental health hospitalization unit called UHB-SM.

Begun in June 2019, this expansion work also provides, in addition to this unit which will include 10 beds and will be fitted out on the ground floor of this new section, the addition of eight additional beds on three care units, for a total of 24 beds on the upper floors. In addition, the basement will be enlarged for the needs of

the existing kitchen.

Since the UHB-SM will be adjacent to the existing emergency unit, this will make it easier, according to the communications team of the Integrated Health and Social Services Center (



CISSS) des Laurentides. The movement, treatment and care of patients as well as customer safety will be enhanced and the new UHB-SM aims to respond to the lack of adequate space for insulation needs when there is a need for short-term hospitalization for observation and orientation of the patient. At the same time the new unit will be providing a warmer and more welcoming environment, promoting the well-being of patients and thus helping to reduce their stigmatization.

Note that this work, which must be completed next spring, has little or no impact, according to CISSS des Laurentides, on the delivery of care and services to patients and will be carried

out without any interruption of care to the population.

Currently, the Saint - Eustache Hospital has 261 short-term beds, none of which are in mental health. Some of these beds, or 74, are distributed in rooms with three to six beds, and these will all be transferred to single rooms once the modernization work is completed.



In Saint-Eustache: water meters offered free of charge



In accordance with the Québec government's drinking water conservation strategy, the City of Saint-Eustache will proceed, in the coming months, with the installation of water meters in nearly 400 residences served by the water network in the territory. These installations will be done on a voluntary basis for anyone wishing to know their actual water consumption. The data collected will be treated confidentially and will not be used for water taxation or pricing purposes. They will be used primarily for statistical purposes.

We invite homeowners to apply to see if their home is eligible for the installation of a water meter. This will allow them to know precisely the water consumption of family members and to locate, if necessary, leaks on their devices

and thus avoid wasting our blue gold. », said Mayor Pierre Charron, when the program was announced.

What will be the procedure for installing water meters?

A private contractor will install water meters in residents' homes by appointment. The meter will be connected to the water inlet, after the residence shut-off valve. Once the installation is complete, the readings will be taken by city staff, outside the residence, while residents can see their water consumption on the meter display.

With Véronique Dupuis, consultant in history and heritage interpretation



Hydro-Québec customers have until September 30 to enter into a payment arrangement if they wish to continue benefiting from the suspension of administration charges. They can do so at any time in their Customer Space on our website or by calling customer services at 1 888 385-7252 during business hours.

The purpose of this measure is to avoid penalizing customers who might not be able to pay their electricity bill because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

For customers who fail to work out a payment

arrangement, the waiving of administration charges as announced last March 22 will cease to apply on September 30.

It should be noted that the moratorium on service interruptions for nonpayment of bills will be extended until further notice. As a result, no customers will have their power cut off.

Customers who expect to have financial difficulties are reminded that they can enter into an arrangement with Hydro-Québec at any time to plan the deferral of their payments.

Video conference on ecological renovations









ouvetsi Comfort food in a clay pot

Youvetsi is a baked Greek dish made with chicken, lamb or beef and pasta, either (orzo) or noodles, and tomato sauce, usually spiced with allspice and sometimes cinnamon, cloves or bay leaves. Other common $ingredients\ include\ onions/shallots, garlic, beef stock, and\ red\ wine, as\ well\ as\ some\ cheese\ to\ serve.$ So if you have a clay Dutch oven (pot), I'm going to suggest using it!

It's an ancient method of cooking which uses a two-part (top and bottom) unglazed clay pot that has first been soaked in water. When heated to a high temperature, steam is created, adding moisture to whatever is being cooked and retaining nutrients.

Just be careful before using it, follow these steps

- Always soak the pot in cool water for $10\ {\rm to}\ 15\ {\rm minutes}$ before using it.
- Never put a clay pot in a preheated oven because it will crack from the shock of the heat
- Bake at high temperatures (400° to 475° F) to let the moisture that's saturated the clay slowly turn into steam.
- Do not place a hot clay pot on a cold or cool surface as it will crack. So, when taking a hot pot out of the oven, always place on a wood or heat resistant trivet or potholder.
- Clay pots should not be used on top of the stove.
- Add liquids sparingly -- as any food you're cooking will throw off liquids and you don't want the pot to overflow.
- Because it retains heat, a clay pot will continue to cook after you take it out of the oven. So, either factor this into your cooking time or else remove the cover and the food soon after removing it from the oven.

You will need:

- 500 g Medium Orzo
- 1 kg beef or Chicken pieces (you can leave bone on) in portions
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 cloves of garlic, grated
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 4-5 allspice grains
- 1/2 tsp. cumin
- 2 tbsp. tomato paste
- 150 ml red wine
- 800 g grated tomatoes
- 1 tbsp. sugar
- 700 ml water
- 150 g Kefalotyri (Greek hard cheese) or Asiago, grated
- olive oil
- salt
- pepper

INE I TIOD

In a non stick pot, heat 5-6 tsp. of olive oil.
Salt and pepper the beef (or any other type of meat) and sauté for 3-4 minutes on all sides until golden brown. Transfer the beef to a plate. to a plate.

In the same pot, sauté the onion for 2-3 minutes until it softens, adding salt and pepper to taste. Add the garlic, cinnamon stick, allspice and cumin and sauté for 1 minute.

Continue to sauté adding the tomato paste, scraping the bottom of the pot with a wood-

Add the meat together with its juices and pour in the wine. Once most alcohol has evaporated, add the grated tomatoes and the

Bring to a boil, lower the heat and add the water. Cover with a lid and allow the meat to simmer for about 1 hour. At the end, remove the cinnamon stick and the allspice.

In another shallow pot, heat 3 thsp. of olive oil. Sauté the Medium Orzo for 2-3 minutes and remove from the heat.

In a greased heat resistant dish or pan, pour in the orzo and top with the beef and its sauce (if using bones and whole spices, make sure they are removed either by picking them out or using a sieve to strain) stirring gently to distribute the ingredients evenly. If the orzo is not fully covered by the sauce, add as much water to cover by 2-3 cm.

Cook in a preheated oven at 400 degrees Fahrenheit for about 30 minutes, until brown and all water is absorbed. Note: if you are us-ing the clay pot do not put in preheated oven.

Serve warm, sprinkled with grated cheese.


