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
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
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VacciBUS gets a ministerial visit!

The Minister of International Relations and La Francophonie, Minister of Immigration, Francization and Integration and Minister responsible for the Laurentians region, Nadine Girault, visited Sainte-Agathe-des-Monts, on June 25, to meet the team of professionals working in the mobile vaccination unit, the VacciBUS.

"I was impressed by the immense organization and the work that is carried out by each of the

professionals in the VacciBUS. I hope that this great initiative of the CISSS des Laurentides will encourage even more people to protect themselves with the vaccine against COVID-19 and thus hope for a return to normal life even more quickly," the Minister underlined.

214 doses were administered during the passage of the VacciBUS from the beach at Sainte-Agathedes-Monts. "All summer, in the Laurentians, the vaccine will reach out to people in the area. Already, we can see a favorable response from the population when using VacciBUS. The activities of this mobile unit began on June 19. During each outing, nearly 150 doses are administered, "said

Until August 15, the CISSS des Laurentides VacciBUS will travel the roads of the Laurentians to be present in various events and busy places or in a municipality to facilitate access to vaccination. The population can therefore receive a first or a second dose of the vaccine against COVID-19, always according to the available dose allocations, without an appointment, in a bus specially equipped for the occasion.

There are only two "races" of people: the decent and the indecent

Good people and bad people can be found in every group

Te're all influenced by the environment we grow up in and our life experiences. We thus adopt paradigms in our effort to make sense of the world around us. Sometimes these perspectives serve us well but other times our core beliefs prevent us from seeing the truth. Yet there

is perhaps nothing more life-giving than experiencing the discovery of an ultimate truth.

By observing human behaviour in Nazi concentration camps, psycholgist and Jewish prisoner Viktor Frankl came to several important conclusions.

In the group of prison guards, there were some sadists but there were also few who risked their lives to save prisoners. vast majority, however, simply went along the cruelty. Frankl also noticed these distinctions existed among the prisoners, though not in the same proportions. The Nazis relied heavily on prisoners called "kapos" to keep other inmates in line, and they could be quite sadistic as well.

Frankl concluded there were only two "races" of people: the decent and the indecent, and both are found in every group.

This being true, how ridiculous is all our Islamophobia, anti-Semitism, categorization of followers of any religion, political party, members of any gender, people of any nationality or ethnicity.

There are good people and there are bad people in every group. There are people who live principled lives, respecting their neighbours and the environment, seeking truth, living in humility, and embracing a love for all humanity. There are also people who are selfish and manipulative but, on the surface, are indistinguishable from anyone else.

Perhaps even more importantly, Frankl points out that in each of us we find the same potential for good or bad. No person is purely virtuous or evil. Each of us makes choices every day that either make the world better or lead down

the path of destruction, and we do not always know which choice leads in each direction.

This being the human condition, what can any of us do? First, it is important not to judge others. Each person is

> dealing with challenges we cannot begin to comprehend. We need to humbly ask ourselves: "If I was in that person's situation, knowing what they know and not knowing what they don't know, would I have chosen differently?"

> We can reflect on the behaviour of those who came before us, but it is far more important to ask ourselves what we can do to improve the world around us, as well as ourselves. Ancient wisdom has always told us to ask: "What's the truth in this situation? What is the respectful thing to do? How can I show love and compassion for myself and my neighbour?"

Given that there will always be a small group of people who advocate for a lack of compassion, it's

vital that we courageously challenge their views. As convenient and logical as these opinions may appear, selfishness, irrational fear, greed, and disrespect for those who share the planet with us will always lead to our demise.

What does this mean for those of us living in a world where genocide is still commonplace?

We can be like the concentration camp guards who simply allowed the cruelty around them to continue or we can be like the guards who maintained their humanity by embracing the humanity of others.

Frankl witnessed the very worst and the very best of people. His writings give us a clear and truthful understanding of our human paradigm.

Each of us will leave a legacy. Will our descendants be inspired by the good we've done, or will they spend their lives trying to heal the wounds we've caused?

The choice is ours.

Bike patrol

All means are good to move, but the RIPTB urges caution and respect of the Highway Safety Code (CSR). Article 471 of the Highway Safety Code provides that it is prohibited to drive a road vehicle, the load of which:

- is not securely retained or sufficiently covered so that no part of it can move or become detached from the vehicle.
- is placed, restrained or covered in such a way as to reduce the driver's field of vision or to mask its lights and headlights;
- is placed, restrained or covered in such a way as to compromise the stability or handling of the vehicle;
- is not placed, retained or covered in accordance with the regulations made on load securing standards



When someone close to you asks for money over the phone, ask them personal questions, such as their father's first name or their city of birth. You can even question that person in relation to a specific memory that only they can recall. Ask him to call you back in 10 minutes.

This will allow you to take the time to check with another family member.

On the phone, always refuse to give your credit card number to someone you haven't contacted yourself. Don't be afraid to hang up if the person insists. If you believe you have been the victim of fraud, file a complaint with your police department and report the case to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Center (1 888 495-8501).

New in Charbonneau Park:

Rosemerites Can Soon Rent Human-Powered Watercraft



Starting July 3, between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m., residents will have a chance to rent canoes, kayaks or stand-up paddleboards (SUPs) for adventures on the islands and marshes of the Mille Îles River at the Charbonneau Park waterfront chalet, 50 Charbonneau Street. Rosemerites will always enjoy a 15% discount on these rentals, upon presentation of a valid Citizen's Card or an ID that displays their address.

Canoe rentals as well as single or double kayak rentals start at \$37.50, \$34.60 and \$51 respectively for a three-hour period, and SUPs, \$31, for two-and-a-half hours. A one-hour introductory session may also be

reserved during the first visit for \$15.50 to \$25.50, depending on the watercraft. Family packages are available as well. Full

Thanks to an agreement between the Town of Rosemère and Éco-Nature, this new service is part of an ambitious regional recreational and utilitarian transportation project launched by Éco-Nature and its municipal and regional partners. In addition to contributing to the conservation and enhancement of the Mille Îles River and its tributaries, this project provides water sports enthusiasts with greater access to the river on the Rosemère territory.

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After nearly a year of work, the new Charbonneau Chalet will be inaugurated at the end of the summer. For the occasion, the Town of Rosemère is holding a contest among its citizens to ensure that its name will reflect the unique character of its community.

To participate, residents must share the name proposal on Facebook by commenting on the post provided for this purpose by July 18. The new name will be unveiled at the building's grand opening later this summer. The winner of the contest will be invited to celebrate this major milestone for the Town of Rosemère and receive a \$100 gift card to Place Rosemère!

- The name selected will be the one that best meets the following selection criteria:
- The name must be easy to pronounce and original in nature;
- The name must have a parallel with the location of the chalet, i.e. the shore of the Rivière-des-Miles-Îles;
- The name must reflect the rich historical heritage of the Town of Rosemère;
- The name must not be that of a living personality.

Only Rosemerites are eligible for the contest and a selection committee will be formed to identify the grand prize winner. The committee reserves the right not to retain any name submitted.





The Foibles of Money

I am a career banker with a nice little sideline as an investor. My style is not high risk with bitcoins, penny stocks, and the like. I try to buy the best companies when they temporarily stumble.

I try to advise others. When my aunt would call and ask, "What do you have for me, son?" I was able to help her make some money.

I have not had results that were as good with

my best friend. I was helping him run some money, and at the one-year mark, he had a 95% return; \$8,000 turned into \$15,600. His portfolio was doing better than mine on a percentage basis, because he was far more aggressive and less risk averse than me.

Even so, we could have done better if he had listened to me.

The thing is I advised him to sell one position, or at least one part of it, in which he had a big gain. He and his wife love the industry and she would not let him. This stock is down.

One stock he bought without us talking, and another he bought against my advice. Now, the \$15,600 is down to \$13,800. At one time, he was holding cash from a stock sold for a gain. I said sit tight until we find a bargain, but that cash was burning a hole in his pocket. Why?

I advised my younger cousin to buy a pot stock that I have a huge gain in. He researched the industry, and told me he bought another one just like mine. But he lost his ass on the one that was "like mine". Why?

It reminds me of an old episode of The Mary Tyler Moore Show (showing my age here). Lou Grant was losing on football bets with his bookie. Then, he began winning using Ted Baxter's system but it wasn't any fun anymore.

Lou then bet his entire bankroll on the Super Bowl, even though Ted's system did not allow for any bet on the Super Bowl. Lou lost but was happy. It was fun again.

What part of human nature is this? Is it just a guy thing, because my aunt did not have it?

Cameron, let's talk about your aunt first. Her attitude is, "Money is good, it makes my life more secure, and listening to Cameron is way easier than laying bricks for a living." She doesn't care if she is betting on the guy

with the hot hand or betting on a guy smarter than the rest. She just wants the money

We would call her a realist.

Then there are your cousin and your best friend. We have a general comment about them. When you realize people usually act from their most base nature, it becomes easier to understand their

Your cousin wants a sense of mastery. He wants to control something. Investing successfully will give him that feeling, the feeling of a do-it-yourself project done well.

He's also troubled by FOMO, the fear of missing

"But I want my own pick, so when I get my big win, it isn't due to Cameron.'

In addition, if he felt you were bragging, he feels envy (he wants to possess what you possess), threatened (my mastery is in doubt), and competition (I'll show that smarty pants Cameron).

Then there's your best friend; money burns a hole in his pocket. That sounds like the itch of the gambler. It's the excitement! Your friend and his wife "have a good feeling" about an industry, the way some people have a good feeling about "sectors" in a casino. They prefer poker to blackjack or craps

Much of their preference is simply good, old-fashioned greed. They want to take advantage of your advice, but they still want more. However, your best friend and his wife haven't made any money yet Their chips are still on the table. It won't be money until they cash out.

And honestly, if you examine your own motives, you feel possessive about their winnings, as if they are losing your winnings. What would you like? You'd like your little ducklings to follow you and thank you for their success.

People are funny about money. Some are more likely to tell you about their sexual life than about how much money they make. When it involves money...money often doesn't have a bonding effect on relationships, it has a breaking the bond effect.

What's in it for others in giving you credit? For most people, the answer is nothing. Your guidance becomes their savvy decision to invest their money

Let's take it slow today. I love using my slow cooker. Remember the commercial for the Ronco oven? set it and forget it? Well, I actually don't have that machine but the next best one is my faithful slow cooker! It was one of my most cherished gifts from my wedding. That's what I love about the slow cooker, you can do so many chores and

even leave your house to do errands while your supper is simmering away.

This is a hearty, savory slow cooker stew with potatoes, carrots, celery, broth, herbs and spices. Once this is served to your plate, you won't be slow gobbling it up!!

The beauty with the slow cooker, the meat always comes out tender and the vegetables perfectly cooked!

This recipe is very easy. It's the classic, using basic ingredients. Feel free to use any other vegetables. If you are planning to use sweet potatoes or peas add them to the last two hours of cooking. They tend to cook very fast and especially the sweet potatoes they will come out mushy if cooked too long.

A little history! Did you know:

Slow cookers achieved popularity in the US during the 1940s, when many women began to work outside the home. They could start dinner cooking in the morning before going to work and finish preparing the meal in the evening when they came home.

A company based in Chicago was inspired by a story from his mother which told how back in her native Lithuanian town, her mother made a stew called cholent, a traditional Jewish stew, which took several hours to cook in an oven. An inventor Robert Glen Martin, from Boonville, Missouri, was to develop Naxon's bean cooker into a large scale production model which could cook an entire family meal, going further than just cooking a bean meal. Martin also designed and produced the mass-making machines for Rival's manufacturing line of the Crock-Pot. The cooker was then reintroduced under the name "Crock-Pot" in 1971.

Recipe Easy as 1-2-3 and 4!

- 1. Prepare your beef. First, you'll need to trim the beef of excess fat. Flour the beef cubes and brown the meat (just helps to create additional flavor)
- Add the liquids. Pour your beef broth, can 2. Add the liquids. Four your beet broth, can of beer, tomato paste, worcestershire, balsamic vinegar, bay leaves, thyme and salt and pepper into the bowl of your slow cooker. Stir together with the beef until combined.
- 3. Next stir in the garlic, onion, leeks, carrots and potatoes. Cover and cook on high for 5-6 hours. The longer it cooks, the better and more tender the stew will be. (Add the peas and sweet potatoes at the remaining 2 hrs of cooking)
- 4. Thicken it. Once the stew is done, add the cornstarch to the broth and stir in, Enjoy!

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
 3 pounds stewing beef cubes trimmed of excess fat
- Freshly ground salt and pepper
 1 1/2 cups beef broth (or water)
 1 can beer (or wine/water/beef broth)
 2 tablespoons tomato paste
 1 tablespoon worcestershire sauce
 1/2 tablespoon balsamic vinegar
 1 teaspoon dried thyme
 2 bay leaves
 1 teaspoon salt

- 2 bay leaves 1 teaspoon salt Lots of freshly ground black pepper 1 whole chili pepper
- 4 garlic cloves, 1 large white Spanish onion cut into chunks

- 1 cup chopped leek
 4 -5 large carrots peeled and cut into 1/2-inch diagonal slices
 2-3 stalks celery cut into diagonal slices
 1 regard rulen gold netetors, digad into 1 pound yukon gold potatoes, diced into ½

- 2 tbsp cornstarch to add to the broth at the end of cooking only
 2 tbsp flour to cover the beef cubes for
- browning
 1 cup frozen peas
 1 large sweet potato cut into chunks

Instructions

- 1. Add 1 tablespoon olive oil to a large skillet and place over medium high heat. Brown the (floured)beef, seasoned with salt and pepper for 5 minutes. Transfer to large 6 or 8-quart slow cooler.
- 2. Next add in beef broth, beer, tomato paste, worcestershire sauce, balsamic vinegar, thyme and salt and pepper. Stir together with the beef until combined, then add in garlic, onion, carrots, leeks, celery and diced potatoes. Cover and cook on low for 5-6 hours on high.
- 3. Add in frozen peas and sweet potatoes (if using) and cook at the remaining 2 hours
- 4. Once the cooking stops, remove 1 cup of beef broth from the slow cooker and transfer to a medium bowl. Whisk in 2 tbsp corner and transfer to the cooking stops. starch until there aren't any lumps remain-ing. Add back to the slow cooker and stir to

How to describe your ideal boss in a job interview

As part of the interview process, you might be asked to describe your ideal boss. While it's useful to know whether a prospective employer's management style suits your preferences, this can be a delicate question to answer. Among other things, you don't want to come across as being a needy employee or having problems with authority.

While it's important to give an honest answer, playing it safe by listing vague, positive attributes such as "fair" and "respectful" doesn't provide the recruiter with much information about who you are or what you expect from your employer. After all, who would want a disrespectful manager who doesn't treat employees fairly?

Therefore, it's best to provide a precise description that highlights both your ability to work independently and follow directions. Plus, by avoiding obvious answers, you'll show that you've taken some time to reflect on the subject. For example, you could mention that you value managers

who clearly communicate expectations but also encourage independent work.

Additionally, you can support your description with a few concrete examples from previous jobs to highlight your ability to adapt to various leadership styles. Just make sure to focus on what you look for in a boss rather than the qualities you dislike. Lastly, remember to never criticize a prior supervisor as this will likely reflect poorly on you.



How to hire someone for a remote position

If you need to hire someone for a remote position, you should look for a candidate who can work effectively from home. Here's how to find the right person for the job.

Seek out candidates with the right qualities

Telecommuting isn't for everyone, and some people aren't as productive when they work from home. To help narrow down your search for a remote employee, look for key qualities such as:

- Proactive communication skills. Since most exchanges with a remote employee happen over the phone and through email or instant messaging, you need someone who can clearly express their ideas. Consider having candidates take a writing test.
- Strong initiative. Remote employees must be able to complete their work without direct and constant supervision. You can reach out to former employers to learn more about a candidate's ability to work autonomously.
- Focus and organization skills. Someone
 who works from home needs to be
 adept at managing their time, establishing priorities and maintaining
 concentration despite distractions (especially if they have children at home).

Ask questions to assess an applicant's suitability

Use the interview process to further evaluate whether a candidate is well-suited for a remote position. For example, you should ask:

- Do you have any experience working remotely?
- Are you comfortable using platforms such as Zoom and Skype?
- How do you remain focused when working from home?
- What strategies do you use to stay productive at home?

Finally, be sure to discuss your expectations about flexible work hours and confirm which time zone a prospective employee is based in.



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
Larivière, François 1965 - 2021



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
