

### JGH took part in multinational research collaboration with

partners in U.S. and Sweden

An international meta-study conducted by researchers at the Lady Davis Institute of the Jewish General Hospital in Montreal, Karolinska Institutet in Sweden and VA Boston Healthcare System in the U.S. has identified a specific gene variant that protects against severe COVID19 infection.

#### The key to understanding

"That we are beginning to understand the genetic risk factors in detail is key to developing new drugs against COVID-19," said study co-author Brent Richards, senior investigator at the Lady Davis Institute of the Jewish General Hospital and professor at McGill University in Montreal.

The researchers managed to pinpoint the variant by studying people of different ancestries, a feat they say highlights the importance of conducting clinical trials that include people of diverse descents.

#### The role of genetics

In addition to old age and certain underlying diseases, say the researchers, genetics can influence whether anyone becomes severely affected or only suffers mild illness from COVID-19. Previous studies, mainly on people of European ancestry, found that individuals carrying a particular segment of DNA had a 20 percent

lower risk of developing a critical COVID-19 infection

According to the research, this DNA segment encodes genes in the immune system and is inherited from Neanderthals in about half of all people outside Africa.

However, this region of DNA is packed with numerous genetic variants, which makes it challenging to disentangle the exact protective variant that could potentially serve as a target for medical treatment against severe COVID-19 infection.

#### Study's focus on Africans

So, to identify this specific gene variant, the researchers in the study looked for individuals carrying only parts of this DNA segment.

Since the Neanderthal inheritance occurred after the ancient migration out of Africa, the researchers saw a potential in focusing on individuals with African ancestry who lack heritage from the Neanderthals and therefore also the majority of this DNA segment.

The researchers say that a small piece of this DNA region is, however, the same in both people of African and European ancestries. They found that individuals of predominantly African ancestry had the same protection as those of European ancestry, which allowed them to pinpoint a specific gene variant of particular interest.

### Identifying unique variant

"The fact that individuals of African descent had the same protection allowed us to identify the unique variant in the DNA that actually protects from COVID-19 infection," said Jennifer Huffman, the first author of the study

and a researcher at the VA Boston Healthcare System in the U.S.

The analysis included a total of 2,787 hospitalized COVID-19 patients of African ancestry and 130,997 people in a control group from six cohort studies. Eighty percent of individuals of African ancestry carried the protective variant. The outcome was compared with a previous, larger meta-study of individuals of European heritage.

According to the researchers, the protective gene variant (rs10774671-G) determines the length of the protein encoded by the gene OAS1. Prior studies have shown that the longer variant of the protein is more effective at breaking down SARS-CoV-2, the virus causing the disease COVID-19.

### **Pandemic led to collaboration**

According to the research team, the COVID-19 pandemic has spurred considerable collaboration among researchers in different parts of the world. This has made it possible to study genetic risk factors in a wider diversity of individuals than in many previous studies. Even so, they say the majority of all clinical research is still being done on individuals of predominantly European descent.

"This study shows how important it is to include individuals of different ancestries," said the study's corresponding author Hugo Zeberg, assistant professor at the Department of Neuroscience at Karolinska Institutet. "If we had only studied one group, we would not have been successful in identifying the gene variant in this case."

### ROSEMÈRE Tax Bill Now Available Online

The Town of Rosemère is proud to add access to tax bills to its online services on its Voilà! Rosemère communication platform. From now on, residents may receive their tax bills online only and, in so doing, contribute to the transition to a greener future.

To receive their 2022 tax bill online, registration must be completed no later than January 20. After that date, registration will be possible but will be valid for the 2023 tax bill online only.

Please note that residents must first have a Voilà! account in order to access their online tax bill. Registration assistance is available to residents on the Town's website or they can call 450-621-3500.

### Online payment starting late January

In addition, in order to encourage online transactions, municipal tax payments will be able to be made from a secure payment platform starting at the end of January. This service will allow users to schedule pre-authorized payments,

pay various bills issued by the Town (water tax, municipal taxes, etc.), choose a payment method and set up alerts and notifications for future pre-authorized payments. This platform will be accessible through the Town's website and the Voilà! app.

### About Voilà! Rosemère

In closing, the Town wishes to remind its residents that the Voilà! Rosemère digital platform is secure and easy to use. Residents just need to download the app on their smartphone or tablet and create their user profile by entering their address. They may then select the information and notifications they wish to receive by identifying their preferences in their profile. For example, residents can choose to receive notifications of emergency situations and/or reminders for various collections, consult the schedule of activities that interest them, register for online recreational activities and receive all municipal news. In addition, this app will enable them to receive their tax bill, apply for permits online and report non-urgent problems to their town, such as a pothole or a broken streetlight.

The new Mayor of Blainville, Liza Poulin, has been appointed to several positions and to the Union des municipalités du Québec and the MRC de Thérèse-De Blainville in sectors of activity related to fields of action deemed as priorities by the municipal administration, such as the environment, natural and recreational environments and culture.

The Union of Quebec Municipalities (UMQ) is an organization that represents nearly 400 municipalities in Quebec and brings together 50 elected officials, mayors, prefects and presidents of metropolitan communities within its board of directors. The UMQ defends the interests of its members with the Quebec government and informs them about current issues and current debates in the municipal world.

Mayor Liza Poulin therefore sits on the caucus of the municipalities of the Metropolis as a representative of the Northern Crown. She is also a member of the Laurentides regional caucus.

At the level of the MRC de Thérèse-De Blainville, Liza Poulin has been appointed vice-president of the Table Action Culture et Patrimoine, a regional body that brings

### Free open swim for five additional years in Boisbriand

It has become a regular practice for municipalities to share their facilities in the North Shore. Not every town has the financial capability or the infrastructure to build facilities for every sport. In line with this practice the city of Boisbriand renewed an agreement allowing the citizens of Boisbriand to access the facilities of the Saint-Eustache Aquatic Complex for five additional years, i.e. until January 1, 2027.

Formally arranged between the City of Boisbriand, the City of Saint-Eustache and the Association du sport et du plein air, this agreement allows the residents of Boisbriand to take advantage of the Saint-Eustache Aquatic Complex by registering for activities offered at the same rates as the residents of Saint-Eustache. It also offers them free access to free swimming.

"This agreement is part of our desire to offer the citizens of Boisbriand a varied and complete offer of activities for all ages. I invite you to take advantage of these facilities in any season! said Mayor Christine Beaudette. The residents of Boisbriand must obtain a Boisbriand swimming pool card to enable them to register for activities at the Aquatic Complex.

It is important to note that the first agreement was signed in January 2017 to allow the citizens of Boisbriand to benefit from quality facilities at a cost that benefits everyone.

The The CISSS des Laurentides announced that it will extend its walk-in vaccination offer for people who want their first dose of the COVID-19 vaccine. This service will continue to be offered at all vaccination sites in the region until further notice.

People eligible for the 2nd dose or the booster dose must, for their part, continue to make an appointment on Clic Santé. "Our capacity to vaccinate is increasing day by day, for all our vaccination sites. We invite people who are trying to get an appointment or who would like an earlier date to regularly consult the clicsante. ca site, as new time slots are continually being added. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the commitment of the staff at our vaccination sites, which are contributing greatly to increasing the availability of appointments at the moment," said Ms. Rosemonde Landry, President and CEO of the CISSS des

It should be noted that people who have had COVID-19 will be able to obtain, if they wish, a booster dose as soon as the symptoms of the disease end. A minimum interval of three months must have elapsed between the second dose and the booster dose. People with reduced mobility and requiring accompaniment can use our free shuttle service to get to a vaccination

The CISSS des Laurentides also announced that as of January 11, 2022, persons needing care for minor ailments will have access to two clinics in the Laurentian region.

Two of the three new designated pediatric clinics that opened in September for children without a family doctor are broadening their service offer to include adults without a family physician. People can now seek treatment for various health issues, whether COVID-related or not.

To allow the public greater access, consultations at these designated clinics for patients without a family doctor are by appointment only in Boisbriand and Saint-Jérôme.

Persons wishing to book an appointment must meet the following criteria: They must not have a regular doctor, pediatrician or specialised nurse practitioner and must have a minor physical ailment (the list of excluded health issues is available online).

"These designated clinics for patients without a family physician aim to provide an added alternative to people in the Laurentians who need a medical consultation. This type of initiative also helps to lower the pressure on hospital emergency rooms in the region by reducing the number of consultations for non-urgent health problems," said Ms. Rosemonde Landry, President and Executive Director of the CISSS

May in the North Shore as the spring started to finish brought in more news and announcements of vaccinations by an ever-prominent CISSS des Laurentides. That much-awaited stage of the vaccination campaign was announced, as the Minister of Health and Social Services, Christian Dubé, confirmed that appointments for the general population would begin shortly.

Patients with autism spectrum disorder got involved in the community. Since October 2019, the participants of the Tremplin work platform of the Integrated Health and Social Services Center (CISSS) of the Laurentians created sleeping pads using bags of milk. These participants all have an autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and their work of creating mattresses, at the Tremplin work platform, allowed them to help homeless people in the



By a resolution adopted at the municipal council the City of Deux-Montagnes committed to make the fight against climate change a priority, by adhering to the Declaration of Commitment United for the Climate, initiated by the Union of Quebec Municipalities (UMQ). The declaration United for the Climate recalls the leading role of municipalities in the fight and adaptation to climate change. It allows municipalities to make a clear commitment to their population, to act and take concrete steps to fight and adapt to climate change.

The Integrated Health and Social Services Center (CISSS) des Laurentides announced that the second round of vaccination against COVID-19 for residents in residential and long-term care centers (CHSLDs) in the region had been completed since May 8th.

At the May 10 public Council meeting, the Town of Rosemère tabled its financial statements for the year ending December 31, 2020, along with the independent auditors' report, in accordance with the Cities and Towns Act. The financial statements showed a non-consolidated surplus of \$3,445,800, representing 10.7% of the operating budget.



The Integrated Health and Social Services Center (CISSS) shone with the youth stewardship committee, which won a "Stars' award of the Réseau de la santé "(SRS Prize), on May 7, during the virtual presentation organized by the Caisse Desjardins du Réseau de la santé. The project submitted by the head of the team for youth crisis, Marie-Claude Gadbois, and her team, won 2nd place in the performing category, which recognizes efficiency and interdisciplinarity. The Youth Stewardship **2** Committee stood out from the 120 applications received for this 3rd edition.

### JUNE



In June investigators from the Régie intermunicipale de police Thérèse-De Blainville (RIPTB) following a search of a private residence located in Blainville arrested a suspect who operated near high schools in the Laurentians region and sold illegally tobacco and cannabis mainly to minors. The search of the suspect's residence and vehicle led to a major seizure estimated at an approximate value of \$ 100,000.

The CISSS des Laurentides announced the transition to the orange zone for the entire territory. For Dr. Éric Goyer, director of public health for the Laurentians, the regional situation was evolving positively. However, he reiterated the importance of remaining cautious.



The City of Rosemère was called upon to respond to a public presentation of a project by the owners of the former golf course that raised questions among some citizens. According to a press release from the City, it is made clear that neither the City nor the City Council was aware of the project entitled "Quartier Melrose". The project was submitted by François Vachon and Patrick Varin, owners of the former golf course. Following this submission, Rosemère notified the owners in writing that their project was inadmissible due to its non-compliance with the current zoning.



The City of Deux-Montagnes tabled its consolidated financial statements as of December 31, 2020, during the regular municipal council meeting last Thursday June 10th. City representatives announced that in addition to reflecting a prudent and skillful management of public funds, the financial results for 2020 confirm the City's proven capability to develop responsibly while ensuring diversified and quality services for all Deux-Montagnes residents. Also a ban on open fires in or near the forest came into effect on Wednesday evening, June 9, 2021, in the territory

of Deux-Montagnes. Under the municipal by-law 1668, this decision of the Government of Quebec, taken in collaboration with the Société de protection des forêt contre le feu (SOPFEU), resulted in a ban on the use of an outdoor wood-burning fireplace in Deux-Montagnes.



Minister Nadine Girault, on behalf of the Minister of Health and Social Services, Christian Dubé, launched VacciBUS Laurentides which was an initiative of the Laurentian Integrated Health and Social Services Center (CISSS) in partnership with exo, to provide a bus that had been specially designed to take the form of a walk-in mobile vaccination unit.



In order to promote buying local and thereby support the region's economic re-start, the City of Rosemère offered a free page of advertising to local businesses on its territory on the fourth page of the June, August, October and December editions of Rosemère News, the City's municipal newsmagazine. This initiativeentirely funded by Rosemère in the amount of \$12,000—provided local businesses with an opportunity for visibility in all Rosemère households.

### JULY

Due to the significant improvement in its epidemiological situation, the Laurentians region went to the green level of vigilance. In addition to the flexibility already planned at the green level, new reductions in the existing measures were also

After nearly a year of work, the new Charbonneau Chalet was be inaugurated at the end of the summer. For the occasion, the Town of Rosemère held a contest among its citizens to ensure

that its name will reflect the unique character of its community. The new name would be unveiled at the building's grand opening later in the summer.

In July a huge overflowing problem in the North Shore hospitals started which plagues the region up to now. Due to the high occupancy rates in its emergencies, particularly at Saint-Eustache Hospital, the Laurentian Integrated Health and Social Services Center (CISSS) asked the population with non-urgent health problems to opt for other solutions than going to the emergency like consulting their family doctor, pharmacist, a doctor in a walk-in clinic or to contact Info-Santé.

A brand-new concrete skatepark arrived in Deux-Montagnes, to the delight of wheel sports enthusiasts. This new space is in Olympia Park, near the water games along the Chemin des Anciens. Designed for skateboard, scooter, inline skating, and BMX type bike enthusiasts, from beginner to intermediate level, the skatepark also provides a great experience for advanced users. It is notably composed of a quarter moon, a funbox (box with a flat top equipped with a ramp and a small staircase), a grindbox (box with a flat top) and a ramp.



On July 15th the city of Rosemère announced that it entered into an agreement, until October 31, with the Domaine Vert Park so that Rosemerites can access the park's activities free of charge. The Parc du Domaine Vert is a forest park located in urban areas. Its vocation is one of the outdoors, and respect for the environment is fundamental. The activities offered are aimed at families, school groups and businesses. The Parc du Domaine Vert is established by the Régie Intermunicipal through the amalgamation of four municipalities: Blainville, Boisbriand, Mirabel and Saint Thérèse.



On July 19, Mayor Marlene Cordato welcomed the Deputy Prime Minister of Canada and Minister of Finance, Ms. Chrystia Freeland, to the City Hall during her visit to Boisbriand. For the occasion, the mayoress of Boisbriand was accompanied by Liza Poulin, deputy mayor of Blainville, and Mr. Patrick Charbonneau, deputy mayor of Mirabel.

A very thorough report was released by the Conseil Régional de Développement Social des Laurentides made possible through the financial support of the Government of Canada, under the Emergency Fund for Community Support (FUAC) which sheded light into the effects of the pandemic on community organizations and social development in the Laurentians

### **AUGUST**

In August 2021 the critical situation in the ERs of the North Shore hospitals continued. The CISSS des Laurentides sent weekly announcements urging patients with non-life-threatening situations not to go to the ERs.

The Centre aquatique du Lac project would finally see the light of day. This is what the mayoress of the City of Sainte-Marthe-sur-le-Lac, Me Sonia Paulus, announced. Indeed, the Sainte-Marthe-sur-le-Lac administration would appropriate a sum from the very recent improvement of the Gasoline Tax Program and the Quebec Contribution (TECQ), which would reduce the cost of the project for taxpayers to a level similar or even lower than what was approved by the qualified voters when a register on the loan by-law was done in February 2021.



On Wednesday August 18th, Deux-Montagnes blew out 100 candles! To mark this milestone event, the City offered a mobile show to its residents between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m., followed by a pyromusical performance at 10 p.m. at parc Central.



Dancing in the parks! It might have sounded like the title of a musical but the city of Saint-Eustache made it a reality every Monday in August, from 6:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. During those times the citizens of Saint-Eustache had fun by learning new dances online or, simply by practicing the dances of their choice in four municipal parks. 17-33 page 10

"In Saint-Eustache, we consider it important to highlight extraordinary citizens, citizens committed to the community, innovative and visionary citizens who constantly advance projects for the collective good. Mr. Larry Bélisle is one of these exemplary citizens and it is with great pride that today we name the baseball field in his name. »declared Mayor Charron in his welcome address.



Throughout the 3d week of August, the city councils of Boisbriand, Lorraine, Rosemère and Sainte-Thérèse ratified the renewal of the intermunicipal agreement for the Régie intermunicipale de police Thérèse-De Blainville (RIPTB). This agreement, which has a ten-year term, will take effect in 2023.



A new construction site for the Seniors' and alternative home  $\stackrel{\circ}{\aleph}$ was inaugurated at 650, boul. Curé Labelle in Blainville. The new home will have 72 places, 48 for adults with specific needs, 24 for seniors, 6 households with 12 places each, 2 houses for seniors and 4 houses for adults with special needs. The seniors' center will accommodate seniors with a very great loss of autonomy and who, in a proportion of about 80%, have major neurocognitive disorders. The alternative home will accommodate z adults with a physical disability, and or intellectual disability, in autism spectrum disorder and significant needs for support . daily. By March 14, 2022, Theresians of all ages are invited to participate in the Snow Castle Challenge. This contest provides the perfect opportunity to play outside and enter for one of the many entry prizes.

Participating is simple! Build a snow fort or castle in your backyard or in a park near your home, and take a picture of it! Then register at the Défichateaudeneige.ca by selecting the Laurentians region and the MRC of Thérèse-De Blainville.

To the question "Which category is it?" choose the "Family/Friends" option from the drop-down menu. Then choose "City of Sainte-Thérèse" under the question "Is your castle participating in an event?" ". You have until March 14 to participate!

"Playing in the snow is a pleasure that has no age. So, dress the whole family warmly, give free rein to your creativity and above all, have fun! Do not hesitate to go to a park or a roundabout near you to build your snow castle and enter it in the contest without delay," said the mayor of Sainte-Thérèse, Mr. Christian Charron.

### About the Snow Castle Challenge.

In 2011, two nurses from Matagami had the idea of creating the Fort en Famille project with the aim of getting children active who do not usually involve themselves with a lot of winter sports. With the support of the Kino-Québec consultant from Baie-James, a first event was held.

In the winter of 2012, the Abitibi-Ouest Group of Healthy Lifestyle Partners, with the

support of the region's Kino-Québec councillor, deployed the project in 3 municipalities of the MRC. In the winter of 2013, the entire territory of the MRC de l'Abitibi-Ouest was targeted with a result of 268 families registered.

In February 2014, the H2GO network of La Haute-Saint-Charles, inspired by Fort en famille, got together to launch the first edition of the Défi château de neige in Quebec City. The members of the H2GO Network wanted to offer families an opportunity to enjoy Quebec winters through the pleasure of outdoor play. After a first year in which 200 families registered, the H2GO Network had the ambition to make it a regional initiative. For this reason, the Challenge was presented to the Regional and Local Mobilization for Healthy Lifestyles, Weight and Health in the Capitale-Nationale region, which immediately took an interest in further developing the project. This was the project leader until 2017. It was then that the project was taken over by the Leisure and Sports Unit of the Capitale-Nationale.

In 2018, five administrative regions of Quebec participated in the Snow Castle Challenge organized by the Recreation and Sports Unit of the Capitale-Nationale. 375 castles were built by families and friends, early childhood centres, schools and organizations. This project was a huge success with everyone.

This event is now deployed at the provincial level from 2019 and the years to come. 11 regions participated in the Challenge for the 2019 edition. The Snow Castle Challenge wishes to become a challenge with a high reputation. It will participate in the long term in positioning Quebec as an active province in winter, and where we will have the most snow castle constructions. It wishes to promote healthy lifestyles and foster the interest of children and families in outdoor physical activity during the winter season.


