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# Green light for the development of the Nature Park

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The City of Saint-Eustache welcomed the favourable final decision of the *Commission de protection du territoire agricole du Québec* (CPTAQ) regarding the development of the Nature Park. The green light having been given; everything is now in place for the development of the largest protected green space in the city.

By virtue of this decision by the CPTAQ, the City will be able, as it planned, to deploy its natural space development plan as early as 2023. "As soon as it was acquired, this project made it possible to ensure the perpetual preservation of a fragile and extremely precious ecosystem, within which we find a variety of fauna and flora. Thanks to the favourable decision rendered, we now intend to develop what constitutes a collective green heritage of great value for the residents, so outdoor activities and educational activities can be held, which will not affect the environment" said the mayor of Saint-Eustache, Mr. Pierre Charron.

For the convenience of users, the development and enhancement plan for the park includes the construction of a reception chalet and the development of an unpaved parking lot. A multipurpose trail will also be developed for cross-country skiing, snowshoeing and skating in winter, as well as for hiking and nature observation in other seasons. In addition to preserving the significant canopy already present, the city plans to enrich it with a massive planting of maple trees in the part of the park where a sugar bush is already present, in order to eventually allow maple production.

"In its decision, the CPTAQ recognizes that the uses of the Nature Park are in no way incompatible with agricultural activities in the area, and very favourably welcomes the project to develop and operate the sugar bush. We are extremely happy with the outcome of our efforts, particularly for the Eustachois and Eustachoises who will be the first beneficiaries," said the municipal councillor Patrice Paquette, president of the Commission for land use planning and housing.

"A presentation of the development concept will be made to citizens over the next few months, in order to inform them of the steps to come until the project is completed," specified the municipal councillor responsible for outdoor files, Mr. Yves Roy.

### Brief history of the project

In 2017, the City of Saint-Eustache acquired a wooded area of 664,184.3 m², in order to preserve it in perpetuity and make it a natural and recreational four seasons park. For the purchase of this land, the City received significant contributions from the Government of Quebec, the Montreal Metropolitan Community (CMM) and Hydro-Quebec. More specifically, \$994,431 was paid by Hydro-Québec under its Integrated Enhancement Program (PMVI), following the construction of Patriotes substation, while \$1,051,806 were granted by the CMM and the Government of Quebec through the Greater Montreal Green and Blue Infrastructure Program.

"In 2022, we also began a process to acquire a series of adjacent lots, with the aim of expanding the perimeter of the park. The acquisition of these lands as well as the construction of the reception chalet will also be the subject of requests for financial support from the CMM, again within the framework of the Green and Blue Infrastructure Program of Greater Montreal. We are very confident that these requests will be approved, and that this whole project can be carried out without impacting taxpayers" concluded the mayor.



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## Quebec's manufacturing/export sector suffering from labour shortage, according to MEQ

39 per cent of businesses have thought of moving outside province, says lobby group

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According to the Manufacturers and Exporters of Quebec (MEQ), at least \$356 million was lost in the past year because of ongoing labour shortages in the province's manufacturing sector.

### Losses piling up

The MEQ represents 1,100 manufacturers across Quebec. The manufacturing sector in Quebec employs more than 497,000 people, representing 12.6 per cent of the Gross Domestic Product, as well as 86.1 per cent of exports.

The lobby group says the losses were the result of cancelled contracts, repeated delays as well as losses resulting from investments that were delayed or cancelled.

### Jobs going unfilled

According to an annual survey conducted by the association, nearly all of the businesses in Laval, the Laurentians and Lanaudière that were contacted confirmed having an average 27 vacant job positions.


One of the immediate results, according to the MEQ, is that 39 per cent of businesses in the three regions have thought seriously about relocating at least part of the activities to another region of the world, or of contracting work to sub-contractors in other regions.

Fifty-four per cent of respondents said the labour shortage is impacting the mental health of workers. The industrial sectors in Quebec most impacted by the labour shortage are parts and materials manufacturing for transport, machine manufacturing and the food industry.

### Quebec not doing enough

While less well-paid jobs are difficult to fill, those paying more competitive salaries are the most difficult to find employees for. According to the MEQ, nearly half the vacant positions are in the \$20 to \$29 per hour range, while 38 per cent pay more than \$30 per hour. Six out of 10 businesses in the survey were of the opinion that the provincial government could be doing a lot more to help relieve the problem.

"While there is more and more talk about an economic recession, Quebec and its regions have a greater need for prosperous businesses," says Véronique Proulx, president and executive-director of the MEQ. "In order to ensure their competitiveness against international



players, they need people. There is no magic solution to fix the issues underlying the labour shortage in the manufacturing sector. But it is possible to use a series of levers to help alleviate the impacts on our businesses in Quebec, the Laurentians, Lanaudière and Laval."

immigration levels, the acceleration of automation and robotization, and an increase in the number of manufacturers benefiting from training programs as factors affecting the situation.

"We are at the dawn of a recession, so the

government should be making the labour shortage a priority, while doing more, faster, to support manufacturing businesses, which are the pillars of our regional economic development," added Proulx.

## If you did not like Bill 96, pay attention to what feds are doing with Bill C-13

### It's unacceptable and reprehensible

If you think Quebec's Bill 96 threatens the future of the English-speaking community in this province, wait until you see what is coming down the pike as the federal government moves forward with its updates to the Official Languages Act.

The proposed legislation, known as Bill C-13, could fundamentally change the nature of Canada, stripping it of the distinction as an officially bilingual country.

As it is proposed now, the bill will no longer require the federal government to protect minority language rights in Quebec. It would, essentially, as one analyst put it, eliminate more than 50 years of official language policy as we know it. It will drive a stake into the heart of the notion that Canada has two official languages from coast to coast to coast.

So if you had consoled yourself that the provincial government's move to limit the use of English in the past year will be tempered somehow by the federal government's protection, let this be a wake-up call. The federal cavalry is poised to abandon its post in the fight for minority linguistic rights in this province.

Too alarmist, you say?

Recently, the Quebec Community Networks Group, the umbrella organization that includes just about every English-language organization in the province – from the Townshippers' Association to the Quebec Farmers' Association, the Quebec Community Newspapers Association to the Quebec Federation of Home and School Associations – issued a call demanding the federal government withdraw the bill.

In a statement, QCGN said Bill C-13 "dramatically alters the Official Languages Act in ways that would profoundly damage the vitality of English-speaking Quebec."

The bill is deeply flawed in its intent.

At its heart, Bill C-13 would specifically recognize Quebec's Charter of the French Language within the framework of the Official Languages Act. This means that Quebec's Charter of the French Language, which was amended this year by the CAQ's Bill 96 that makes French the only language of Quebec, would be incorporated into the federal legislative framework.

If this sounds like a lot of legislative gobbledee-gook, it is. But it represents a fundamental and profound shift in Canada's commitment to bilingualism. It will eliminate the federal government's obligation to promote minority language rights in this province.

The bottom line is that this would be a first. No longer would Quebec's language laws govern what falls simply under provincial jurisdiction, it would also dictate language provisions for all things that fall under federal jurisdiction in Quebec as well. That includes banks, the post office and federally chartered companies.

In essence, if this bill becomes law without amendments, forget about receiving information in English in Quebec from Canada Post.

But in other provinces, the postal service would continue to provide services in both languages.

But that is not all. By doing this, the federal government would be saying that its Official Languages Act would be beyond the reach and protection of the Canadian Charter of Human Rights and Freedoms because it officially looks to uphold Bill 96, which was passed in Quebec completely shielded by the notwithstanding clause of the charter.

That would be a first since Canada became an official bilingual country in 1969 and since the 1982 Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms guaranteed the right of official-language minorities to instruction in their language. Essentially, what was envisioned by Lester B. Pearson and Pierre Trudeau would be swept away.

As QCGN pointed out, the federal government is proposing "by amending the Official Languages Act, to make the protection and promotion of only one of Canada's official languages its fundamental purpose" in this province.

How can that be acceptable?

And doing it by side-stepping its own charter of rights, how is that not reprehensible?

As proposed, Bill C-13 cannot be allowed to move forward.

# Ottawa announces funding for COVID-19 autism challenges in Quebec

Projects to improve capacity to address issues stemming from pandemic

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The Trudeau government last week announced funding of over \$1.8 million for four projects aimed at addressing the negative impacts of COVID-19 on autistic individuals in Quebec.

COVID-19 presented significant challenges to accessing resources for autistic people and their families and caregivers. Disrupted routines and restricted or reduced access to programming, services, and activities had and continue to have a negative impact.

As well, due to the pandemic, many people in Canada, including autistic people, continue to experience increased stress, anxiety, and depression.

### Here are the projects:

- Spectrum Productions will receive \$464,945
  to adapt its in-studio programs and services
  into a nationally scalable virtual hub where
  Autistic creatives of all levels can engage
  with an inclusive, diverse and supportive
  community and access various social and
  educational training and employment opportunities online.
- McGill University will receive \$470,000 to create an online platform where caregivers of Autistic children can acquire the necessary knowledge, skills and resources to empower children, improving their well-being and functioning. The project will reach low-income populations disproportionately affected by COVID-19 and seek to increase skills and support training to help improve the lives of Autistic individuals, their families and caregivers.
- The Centre Hospitalier Universitaire Ste-Justine will receive \$469,485 to deliver the AUTISME 5SSE (Social Support, Stigma-Free Care, and Experiential Knowledge) project to address the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on the determinants of health of autistic individuals and their families through social support and reducing barriers to care.
- The Centre d'innovation sociale en agriculture in Victoriaville will receive \$442,020 to develop and test the L'insertion socioprofes-

sionnelle des jeunes adultes présentant un trouble du spectre de l'autisme par l'agroalimentaire program. The program will support young autistic adults entering the workforce in the agrifood industry.

### **Overcoming barriers**

"Our government is committed to addressing barriers for autistic individuals when it comes to their health and well-being," said Outremont Liberal MP Rachel Bendayan, announcing the funding on behalf of federal Minister of Health Jean-Yves Duclos.

"The pandemic has been a stressful and life-altering experience for many people, and many autistic Canadians and their families have struggled to access critical services while dealing with social isolation," she continued. "The projects announced today will make a real difference in the lives of those who need them."

"Our government is working to improve the health and well-being of people on the autism spectrum and support their families and caregivers," said Duclos.

"To do so, we are committed to working with organizations like the ones announced in Quebec today to help provide community-based autism resources. By easing access to care and important services, we are working towards better support for autistic individuals, their families and caregivers."

### Fed funding for autism

According to the 2019 Canadian Health Survey on Children and Youth (CHSCY), 1 in 50 (or 2%) of Canadian children and youth aged 1 to 17 years were diagnosed with autism. The federal government's budget 2018 allocated \$20 million over five years to better support the needs of autistic individuals, their families and caregivers.

Of this overall investment, \$9.1 million was allocated to establish the Autism Spectrum Disorder Strategic Fund to support community-based projects.

The four projects announced last week are the last under the Autism Spectrum Disorder Strategic Fund. The government says it is working collaboratively with provinces, territories, families, Indigenous organizations and other stakeholders toward the creation of a national autism strategy.

### Radon, the second leading cause of lung cancer after smoking

November: Radon Awareness Month

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The Public Health Department of the Laurentides Integrated Health and Social Services Center (CISSS) is reminding the population of the Laurentians that exposure to high levels of radon in homes can pose a risk to their health. Since 2014, Health Canada has designated November as Radon Awareness Month.

### Do you spend a lot of time in your basement?

Probably more than in past years, a lot of home owners have created an office in the basement for telecommuting, and others have set up a child's room there as well.

Radon is a carcinogenic radioactive gas of natural origin which comes from the disintegration of uranium present in the earth's crust. Outside, it does not present any danger, because it is quickly diluted in the ambient air. This gas seeps into our homes, especially through the foundations. It can accumulate and reach concentrations that can pose a health risk.

Exposure to high levels of radon in indoor air increases the risk of lung cancer. It is the second leading cause of lung cancer after smoking, and the leading cause in non-smokers. In Quebec, 10 to 16% of lung cancer deaths are associated with radon. This is more than 1000 deaths per year. As radon is invisible, odourless and impossible to detect by the senses, it is therefore important to ensure that the concentration

of radon in your home does not exceed the recommended threshold.


### How to protect yourself from radon?


The easiest way to find out the radon concentration in your home is to do a test using a

measuring device called a dosimeter. You can do it yourself or hire a radon expert. If the test result shows a high level of radon in your home, remedial work can be done. Finally, as smokers exposed to radon strongly increase their risk of developing lung cancer than non-smokers, this

is an additional motivation to quit smoking and have radon measured.

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
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### The RIPTB arrests three vehicle thieves

On Tuesday, November 14, 2022, thanks to the vigilance of the Thérèse-De Blainville police department (RIPTB) patrol officers, three men aged between 20 and 26 were arrested; one driving a stolen vehicle, and the other two accomplices in this theft. The vehicles were seized to be examined by experts, and the three suspects were questioned by the investigators.

"For several months, the greater Montreal area has been grappling with a literal plague of theft of Dodge Ram brand vehicles. The *Régie intermunicipale de police Thérèse-De Blainville* invites owners of these vehicles to take the necessary precautions to help the authorities prevent this phenomenon," explained Inspector Martin Charron.

No one is safe from car theft. However, criminals are more likely to steal a vehicle that is not sufficiently protected. So these are the general rules issued by the RIPTB concerning vehicle theft:

- · Lock the car's doors
- Don't leave the keys in the car
- Leave nothing lying around
- Park in a secure car park
- Install an anti-theft alarm and a steering wheel lock
- Opt for an electronic immobilizer system
- · Watermark your car windows
- Invest in a GPS tracking device

### False 911 calls, a major problem!

We have also received this special announcement about false 911 calls from the RIPTB. Cell phones have become a huge problem for 911 operators, who must manage many calls made in error from these devices. Indeed, on these "false calls", several are made from a mobile phone, without the owner realizing it. Pre-programmed button snagged inadvertently, or number dialled by mistake, these calls are often received at emergency centres.

With the holidays approaching, the RIPTB wants to make parents aware of how to dispose of their old cell phones responsibly, rather than



giving them away as toys which can then be used to dial 911 for no reason. Even without the SIM card in the phone, it is indeed possible

to call for help. A situation that may seem trivial, but which overburdens and distracts the emergency services.


