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The City of Sainte-Thérèse innovates in terms of safety and well-being

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The City of Sainte-Thérèse announced the creation of a new position of director, community safety and well-being. During the public session of March 6, Mr. Martin Charron was nominated to occupy this position, which represents a further step in the pursuit of the action plan aimed at the security and well-being of the Teresian community.

An important mandate

By acquiring an internal resource to fill such a position, the City of Sainte-Thérèse is acting as a pioneer and attests to the priority it gives to these issues. The increasing municipal responsibilities in this area justified the establishment of this new position. The goal of the latter will thus be to engage the community in a process of improving safety and the feeling of well-being.



As of April 3, the entry into office of Mr. Martin Charron will concretely aim to coordinate activities relating to road safety, safety around schools, safety in the Village sector, homelessness issues, as well as collaboration with all the stakeholders in the community.

"The City had to act on the various social issues it faces and Mr. Charron was the ideal candidate for this position. His undisputed expertise in this area and his interpersonal skills will enable him to make Sainte-Thérèse one of the most advanced cities in terms of safety and well-being," said Mr. Christian Charron, Mayor of the City of Sainte-Therese.

About Martin Charron

After 33 years as a police officer and recently retired from the Régie intermunicipale de police Thérèse-De Blainville, Martin Charron was one of the leaders of community policing in Quebec, through his role as head of communications and spokesperson for the organization. In particular, he managed activities related to prevention, territorial surveillance, criminal investigations and community safety.

"I feel privileged to obtain this position and I am committed to continuing what I have undertaken in the past decades. After a long career within the police authority, in collaboration with the cities, it is the natural continuity of my career to pursue these commitments and to offer a high quality service to the citizens. I would like to thank the municipal council and the city's general management for their trust," added Mr. Martin Charron.

Quebec budget

Health system "sucks up" almost half of the budget

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On Tuesday, March 21, along with the official first day of spring, the Minister of Finance of Quebec, Eric Girard presented the budget of the province. Below you can read the highlights of the budget:

- Reduction of the first two tax brackets by 1 percentage point for tax year 2023
- Tax reduction: savings of up to \$814 per individual and up to \$1,627 for a couple
- The tax cut will cost Quebec \$1.7 billion annually, and a total of \$9.2 billion over six years
- Solidarity tax credit boost of up to \$78 more per year for an individual
- Projected economic growth of 0.6% in 2023, with an inflation rate of 3.5%
- Projected deficit of \$4 billion in 2023-2024 and return to balanced budgets in 2027-2028
- Quebec's debt will reach \$207 billion on March 31, 2023, or 37.4% of GDP
- Funding for Quebec's infrastructure plan increases by \$7.5 billion over 10 years
- Tax holiday for major investment projects in the province of at least \$100 million
- Contributions to Quebec's pension plan will become optional from age 65 starting in 2024
- Environment: Quebec grants \$500 million to support the creation of the Blue Fund
- Education: government allocates \$2.9 billion to renovate schools, CEGEPs and universities
- Quebec invests \$650 million over six years to finance construction of social and affordable housing
- \$3 billion to make Quebec's health system 'more efficient'

The Girard budget provides, among other things, \$2.2 billion to adapt the health sector to post-pandemic realities.

Jackpot for the health system

Three years into the pandemic, the Legault administration plans to allocate more than \$3 billion over five years for new health initiatives to make the system "more efficient and more flexible for the population."

The Girard budget provides, among other things, \$2.2 billion to adapt the health sector to post-pandemic realities. The health system is the largest expenditure for the Quebec government, at \$52.8 billion out of a total budget of almost \$122 billion.


The government wants to maintain the vaccination and screening centers established during the pandemic, expanding their scope to include other frontline services.

This amount will also allow the update of the emergency measures plan as well as the supply of personal protective equipment and the reduction of the waiting list for surgeries.

"The Health Plan, which has been in place for a year, is a significant change in improving health care for the population and access to such care. The investments announced today are a continuation of this plan" said Eric Girard, Minister of Finance of Ouebec

The government is counting on structural and permanent changes in the health network. So, it plans to invest \$395 million to open new front-line access clinics and add specialized nurses and other professionals. From 2023-2024, 12 clinics, or 6 more than today, will offer their services to the population.

In addition, the Ministère de la Santé et des Services Sociaux (MSSS) will benefit from a \$146 million envelope for the development of the Votre Santé platform, which aims to facilitate appointment scheduling, telemedicine



By December 31, 2022, 20,649 patients had been waiting for surgery for more than a year. The goal, Minister Girard said, remains to absorb that number as quickly as possible to return to pre-pandemic levels.

Elderly and caregivers

Additionally, the Girard budget plans to allocate an additional \$2 billion over five years to care for seniors and their caregivers. Quebec estimates that the number of people aged 65 and over will increase from 1.8 million in 2021 to almost 2.5 million in 2041, representing 26% of the population. Of the amount announced, \$963 million will be used to increase the supply of home support services.

In addition, the budget provides \$705 million for the provision of accommodation adapted to the needs of older people, including \$405 million to ensure continuity of services in private aged care (RPA) homes. Also, 200 million will be allocated to continue funding the establishment of senior housing and 100 million to continue the alignment of public and private CHSLDs.

Vulnerable people

In this budget, the Legault government is releasing \$565 million over five years to improve mental health and social services. So, \$211 million will be used to increase mental health, homeless and substance abuse services, \$110 million to strengthen services for troubled youth and \$50 million to create new respite spaces for parents of children with disabilities.

Canada's dangerous reliance on Chinese goods must end

hree years after we first started hearing the warnings of a global pandemic, there is no doubt that the world has changed.

While it is easy, and for the government perhaps preferable, to blame the pandemic for the challenges that lie ahead, to do so would be dishonest and would serve only to further exacerbate the issue that remains to be tackled head on if we are to have any chance of preserving our way of life.

Every democratic state, including Canada, is confronted with an increasingly uncertain, unstable and conflictual global environment. At the root of that stands a rising totalitarian threat. Our vulnerability to that threat is multifaceted, but among the weaknesses we must address is the vulnerability of our supply chain when it comes to vital goods and materials.

The global pandemic illustrated that significant weaknesses exist in Canada's supply chain. In large measure, the government has sought to address this by focusing almost exclusively on the technical challenges that exist around supply chain efficiency. Using the government's own words, its efforts are focused on "making it easier to plan and co-ordinate transportation initiatives to alleviate bottlenecks," "supporting industry-driven approaches to digital solutions," and other such measures.

While these purely functional measures may be needed, they skirt around the core issue. This country has put itself in a position of extreme vulnerability and overreliance on the importation of critical goods from the world's leading totalitarian state: Communist China.

Given the nature and imbalance of that

bilateral trading relationship, we have made ourselves very vulnerable to political pressures that the regime is now regularly imposing on Canada.

In 2023, China remains Canada's second-largest source of imported goods. It is a country with which we posted a \$45-billion trade deficit in 2021. It is Canada's greatest source of cheap, often low-quality, goods; not only consumer goods, but (as we discovered during the pandemic) also critical medical and personal protective equipment — equipment that on some occasions was shown to be sub-par.

Communist China remained Canada's largest supplier of such goods even after it took the two Michaels hostage for more than 1,000 days from 2018 to 2021.

It remained our second-largest source of imports even after it was condemned, globally and by the Parliament of Canada, for conducting a genocide against the Uyghur minority.

Its exports to Canada actually increased during the second quarter of 2022, despite its crackdown on democracy protests in Hong Kong, its escalating military threats against Taiwan, and its open and blatant support for Russian President Vladimir Putin's war of aggression in Ukraine.

The policy approach of Canada's current government has sought to ignore all of this. But there are now strong national interest and moral imperatives to rethink Canada's relationship with Communist China. Other democracies, some less vulnerable than we are, are already doing this. They are doing so because it is necessary.

The United States has started to encourage and pressure companies to shift their supply chains away from Communist China. The desired shift is toward other democracies and friendly nations in a policy known as "friendshoring," and it is essential.

Australia, Japan, and India have also launched a resilient supply chain initiative. They are now working with the United States in the Quadrilateral Security Dialogue on this very

Canada, however, has been absent from these multilateral processes. Not only has the government absented itself, it has also made no effort to halt even those goods that may have been manufactured using forced labour.

As was recently reported, while the United States stopped 2,398 shipments at its borders based on the possibility that the goods were manufactured by forced labour, Canada stopped only one over the same time period. Even that one shipment, clothing from China, was subsequently permitted to proceed.

If we are genuinely interested in supply chain security, then we need to confront the elephant in the room. If for ideological reasons the current government is unable to do so, then that is yet another reason why Canada urgently needs a new government.

There will be no security for our supply chain, or indeed for our country, if we do not do so.

Saint-Eustache's 911 reaches Nunavik

The emergency call center (9-1-1) of the City of Saint-Eustache will serve 4 villages in Nunavik as part of a pilot project by the Government of Quebec

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The Minister responsible for First Nations and Inuit Relations, Mr. Ian Lafrenière, the President of the Kativik Regional Government, Mrs. Hilda Snowball, and the Mayor of the City of Saint-Eustache, Mr. Pierre Charron, announced the establishment of a one-year pilot project to take emergency calls from four northern villages of Nunavik, namely Umiujaq, Kuujjuarapik, Inukjuak and Puvirnituq.

The deployment of the pilot project, initiated by the Ministère de la Sécurité publique, the Kativik Regional Government and the City of Saint-Eustache, will allow the four targeted communities to be served quickly and to benefit from the quality services of an already established 9-1-1 emergency service that complies with current regulations.

This service, which will be provided from the 9-1-1 emergency center in Saint-Eustache, was made possible thanks to the installation of optical fibre now connecting the four northern communities. It is planned that all the villages will gradually be served by this same telecommunications network. The initiation of this pilot project will also make it possible to collect statistics on the number of calls received as well as the reactions of the Nunavik police

and firefighters to the progress of the project.

"Right now, it is not uncommon in Nunavik for some emergency calls to go unanswered due to a lack of available lines or because the service is not accessible following an outage of the telecommunications systems. Since Saint-Eustache has both the proven technology and the expertise needed to respond quickly and adequately to emergency calls, the launch of this initiative can certainly help avoid this type of situation for the populations concerned, hoping that it will lead to other promising solutions for all of Nunavik," said Pierre Charron, Mayor of Saint-Eustache.

Due to the many logistical issues related to remoteness, affecting, for example, the hiring of personnel and the considerable costs of technological equipment as well as its transportation to Nunavik, the Kativik Regional Government considers that a partnership term with the 9-1-1 emergency center in Saint-Eustache would be the most viable solution for taking any emergency calls from its 14 northern villages.

The pilot project is funded through a \$900,000 grant from the Government Action Plan for the Social and Cultural Well-being of First Nations and Inuit 2022-2027 from the First Nations and Inuit Relations Secretariat. In the event that fibre optic communication is interrupted due to equipment failure, emergency calls will go through the old analog telephone system.

North Shore municipalities unite to create linear park along Mille Îles River

42-kilometre green space will stretch from Deux-Montagnes to Mascouche

Rosemère and Deux-Montagnes are two of the 10 municipalities located along the Mille Îles River that announced last week they are uniting to create a massive waterfront linear park to add to the development of regional green space, while also protecting access to clean drinking water.

Special status sought

Representatives of the municipalities, including Rosemère mayor Eric Westram and Deux-Montagnes mayor Denis Martin, gathered at the Parc de la Rivière-des-Mille-Îles in Sainte-Rose to announce they had signed a common declaration in which they pledged to take all the steps necessary to obtain a provincial statute enshrining a protected status for the 42 kilometres of linear green space by 2024.

According to a statement issued by the mayors, the park will be a "mosaic" of protected spaces, including the Rivière-des-Mille-Îles nature sanctuary, which is currently being studied for enlargement. The mayors want the future linear park to be recognized as a metropolitan conservation area, an idea towards which the provincial government seems already to be favouring with support.

Largest green space

It is estimated that the creation of the new nature preserve could eventually include 5,000 hectares of territory. As such, it would become the largest protected space in the greater Montreal region, and would at the same time contribute to a Montreal Metropolitan Community goal to safeguard 30 per cent of CMM territory by the year 2030.

In addition to their commitment to cooperate on creating



the new park, the ten mayors also agreed to create a regional concertation table for the Mille Îles River in order to ensure continuous financial support for the park and consistent efforts to obtain an official status.

The concertation table would include all the municipalities that have signed the declaration and would be presided by the

Éco-Nature group. The provincial government and the CMM have also stated their commitment to working cooperatively with the table.

Part of Rosemere's DNA

"For more than 20 years, the Town of Rosemère has supported



the mission of Éco-Nature to protect and improve as a priority the Mille Îles River and its tributaries through concrete actions," said Rosemère's Mayor Westram, who is also the prefect for the MRC de Thérèse-De Blainville.

"This treasure, the Mille Îles River, has long been part of the DNA of all Rosemèrites and we are proud to pursue this latest project in order to ensure the sustainability of these magnificent but fragile ecosystems along the river and its shores – all of this being for the greater enjoyment of the citizens of all the riverside municipalities."

A plus for D-M, says Denis Martin

"I am delighted by this partnership which will make it possible to offer to the population living environments that are greener and livelier than ever, while also strengthening our respective recreational and tourism offerings," said Deux-Montagnes mayor Denis Martin.

"In addition to this, the project harmonizes perfectly with the layout of Centennial Park in Deux-Montagnes, where an increase in public access to the water and the naturalization of the shore are among the principal objectives."

A biodiverse territory

"The Mille Îles River is a sector which is rich in biodiversity,"

said Quebec Environment and Climate Change Minister Benoit Charette. "It includes numerous islands and shores with various natural areas, representing a wide diversity of animal habitats. Nearly a hundred of these species face precarious circumstances, notably as a result of the impact of human activity on their habitats."

"The government of Quebec is especially pleased with the creation of the regional concertation table," said Charette. "It will become a place for in-depth reflection for the local partners to exchange ideas and collaborate on the project for the Mille Îles River nature conservation area."

A boost for tourism

The Mille Îles River's potential for generating more tourism from visitors seeking natural settings in the Montreal metropolitan region is considerable, said Caroline Proulx, the Minister of Tourism in the CAQ cabinet.

"Today's announcement opens up enormous possibilities for the regions of Laval and the North Shore so that the river is discovered by all those from here and elsewhere who love the outdoors," she said. "Our government will continue to be present alongside the shoreline municipalities and our partners in order to develop a range of tourist activities that respect nature."

Bois-des-Filion persists about Highway 19

Having still not heard back from the Ministère des Transports et de la Mobilité durable (MTQ) on the Autoroute 19 file, Boisdes-Filion is continuing its mobilization efforts. New actions are planned this spring. To date, residents of Filion have sent some 500 letters to the Minister of Transport, Geneviève Guilbault, asking her to intervene to ensure the harmonious integration of Highway 19 into the urban character of Bois-des-Filion.

"We have not had an answer," confirms the director of the

Bois-des-Filion communications department, Nicolas Carette.

The three demands of Bois-des-Filion

The three major stumbling blocks remain in the file and raise concerns on the part of citizens and elected officials:

- The projected height of the viaduct which will be erected on Adolphe-Chapleau Boulevard and which will divide the city into two east-west sections.
- Access to the Place du Parc sector, since the MTQ plans to completely ban access via avenue de l'Érablière, forcing the detour of nearly 3,000 motorists every day.
- 3. The construction of a ten meter noise barrier on 39th

Avenue. The City wants this wall to be erected as close to the highway as possible, rather than near residences, as currently planned.

For Bois-des-Filion, there is no doubt that there is an urgent need to act. Unable to bring himself to accept the silence of the MTQ, Mayor Gilles Blanchette now intends to solicit the support of surrounding communities and turn to the MP for Blainville, Mario Laframboise.

Other actions, the content of which the City is careful not to reveal for the moment, are also to be expected this spring. Among other support obtained to date, is the Quebec Federation of Quad Clubs (FQCQ).

During the regular meeting of January 18, 2023, the municipal council adopted By-law 704 on the establishment of the Rénovation Québec program, houses with cracks component (maisons lézardées).

In collaboration with the Société d'habitation du Québec (SHQ), this program aims to help owners of eligible buildings whose foundations have cracks related to soil conditions, in order to enable them to carry out necessary stabilization work or to pay them financial assistance following work already completed.

To help the owners concerned, the City has a budget envelope of \$105,000 for 2022 and \$60,000 for 2023, half of which is financed by the Société d'habitation du Québec through its Renovation Quebec program.

The grant awarded will be based on the total amount of eligible work according to the scale below:

- Work over \$100,000: 30% up to a maximum of \$30,000;
- Work from \$50,000 to \$99,999: 25% up to a maximum of \$20,000;
- Work from \$30,000 to \$49,999: 20% up to a maximum of \$7,500.

Program 2022

Under the rules of the Société d'habitation du Québec, the work must have been carried out between January 19, 2022 and January 19, 2023 to be eligible for the Rénovation Québec 2022 program and no feedback will be possible. Owners have until March 27, 2023 to submit a complete application and must demonstrate that at least one pole has been installed to stabilize the foundations of the building, in addition to meeting all the other eligibility criteria set out in the Regulation 704.

Program 2023

To be eligible for the Rénovation Québec 2023 program, the work must be carried out between January 19, 2023 and January 19, 2024 and owners will have until January 20, 2024 to submit an application. It is important to mention that no financial assistance can be granted for work carried out before having obtained the City's approval. The owners concerned must therefore first complete a permit application with the Land Use Planning and Sustainable Development Department and ensure that they meet all the eligibility criteria of By-law 704.
