Citizens weigh in on budget, development, and quality of life

Rosemère's city council met on June 9, and once again, the conversation reflected the town's strong civic spirit. From financial transparency to urban planning and community concerns, the evening was filled with meaningful dialogue between council members and residents.

Mayor Eric Westram kicked off the meeting with a nod to the town's recent public consultations. He thanked residents for their strong participation in the online climate change adaptation survey, saying, "The participation rate is very high, we can see how much this is important to you." He also noted that 116 people attended the in-person consultation on the future of Place Rosemère and reminded others that feedback is still welcome through an online survey. Before diving into the agenda, he took a moment to wish all dads a happy Father's Day in advance, adding, "You play an essential role in the lives of your family."

Council then moved on to the evening's main

business. One item, concerning the replacement of two doors at 303 chemin de la Grande-Côte, was withdrawn from the agenda before it was officially adopted.

A major focus of the evening was the presentation of Rosemère's 2024 financial report. The numbers tell a positive story: the city recorded a surplus of just over \$1.3 million. That surplus came from a combination of increased revenues, mainly through transfer taxes, and reduced spending. When consolidated with partner organizations like the regional water and police services, the total climbs to \$1.44 million. About half of the city's reserve funds are now earmarked for infrastructure and managing future expenses. The city plans to invest \$500,000 of the surplus back into those reserves. A full breakdown is available on the city's website.

Things got more contentious during discussions on urban planning. Two minor exemption requests stood out. One allowed a smaller side setback for a home on rue Maplecrest. The other, on rue Lucerne, approved a detached garage in the front yard despite the property not meeting standard zoning rules. Local resident Sophie

Cardinal questioned why these exemptions were being granted when she had previously been denied a similar request. Mayor Westram replied that the Lucerne case represented "a serious prejudice," which justified the exception. The exchange ended without resolution.

Later in the meeting, Pierre Dubois returned to follow up on a neighbourhood safety issue he raised last month. His concern centers on a poorly visible pedestrian path that remains unaddressed.

Another resident, Muhammad Ali, raised questions about the financial presentation. He felt it lacked detail, particularly on how budgeted funds compare to actual spending so far this year. He also asked why summer day camps have been scaled back despite the surplus. Mayor Westram cited staffing shortages and scheduling issues

with local schools as major roadblocks. Ali also pointed out visible tension among some councillors, noting that "the atmosphere is quite tense between the three elected officials," and called for more collaboration to move projects forward.


Finally, longtime attendee Sylvie Hamel raised concerns about Rosemère's growing population and increased traffic. She said she chose to live in Rosemère for its calm atmosphere, and she's worried it's starting to change. In response, Mayor Westram emphasized the importance of planning ahead, especially if Rosemère is to eventually welcome larger projects, like perhaps, one day, a train line. "We need a vision," he said.

The meeting wrapped up after a few more resident questions, with one clear takeaway: Rosemère's citizens are paying attention—and they expect to be heard.

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Residents weigh in as Rosemère unveils

With Rosemère residents packed into the Lévis-Fortier Hall on June 3, the city took another step in shaping the future of its regional hub by hosting a public consultation on the proposed Special Urban Planning Program (PPU).

The project centers around a massive 46-hectare site bounded by Highway 640, Montée Sanche, and Boulevards Labelle and Bouthillier—an area that includes shopping centre Place Rosemère and its surrounding big-box retailers.

Presentation

The evening began with a detailed presentation of the proposed development, followed by a brief Q & A session where residents asked clarifying questions. Attendees were then divided into workshop tables to discuss their concerns, ideas, and priorities for the area. Each group later shared their key takeaways with the room.

Louis Mazerolle, an urban planner and project lead with the firm L'Atelier Urbain, introduced the plan on behalf of the city, noting it was the product of extensive collaboration and reflection.

According to Mazerolle, the development is a response to several factors: growing housing pressure in Quebec, the declining viability of traditional retail spaces, and new planning obligations introduced by the MRC—a regional county municipality responsible for land use planning—in 2024. "Rosemère has an opportunity here to diversify its housing options," he said.

The proposed plan envisions transforming the current commercial zone into a multifunctional neighbourhood with residential buildings, green spaces, and a more walkable, transit-accessible layout. "In 2040, Rosemère's regional hub will embody a distinctive and sustainable living environment," Mazerolle explained. The design includes a mix of low-to-mid-rise buildings, pedestrian-only streets, and public parks aimed at reducing "heat islands"—urban zones that become significantly warmer than surrounding areas due to concrete, asphalt, and a lack of vegetation.

Mayor Eric Westram acknowledged the pressures shaping the city's future. "My priority is to protect your wallet and responsibly preserve what makes Rosemère unique," he said.

But financial reality is also playing a role. Mayor Westram noted that Rosemère has lost \$110 million in property valuation in recent years, prompting the city to raise taxes on both businesses and residents in 2025. Without new development, he warned, Rosemère could lose its competitive edge within the next decade.

Residents react

Shelley Townsend, a real estate agent and resident since 2003, attended the meeting with mixed feelings. "I think we need something that will give the opportunity to residents of Rosemère to have the option to either rent or to buy," she said. "I think we need a diversity of products?

Townsend questioned the timing of the project, pointing to the unresolved \$287 million lawsuit over a former golf course. She believed it was inconsistent to push forward with new development before resolving existing legal disputes.

She also voiced concern over the emphasis on rental housing. "People who own property take better care of properties as a rule," she said. Mazerolle previously highlighted that the city is planning for a population that can no longer afford the current housing stock.

And while much of the focus remained on future development, the evening's workshops were met with some skepticism. "I don't think it's what they wanted to hear," said Townsend. "We don't want [the buildings] to be too elevated. We want to make sure we keep our green spaces. We want to keep the look of Rosemère the way it is."

Andrée Boily, a Rosemère resident of nearly 40 years, said the presented project has merit but echoed frustration shared by Townsend and others in the room. "There are a lot of consultations in Rosemère, but they often lead nowhere... nothing ever happens," she said.

She called for more affordable housing options tailored to local needs, but townhouses and small apartment blocks that young adults and seniors could realistically afford. "You don't choose a first apartment that costs \$3,500 at 22 years old,"

When it came to discussing the evening's announcement, Boily also raised concerns about the timing, pointing out that the project is being discussed close to the upcoming municipal election. She emphasized the importance of ensuring the plan leads to concrete action, not just ideas on paper.

Despite different perspectives, Mayor Westram stressed that the city is listening. "This consultation is not a mere formality," he said. "Your contributions today will directly inform our thinking."

Residents who missed the event had time to weigh in on June 11, as an online version of the consultation remained open via the city's website.





To respectfully and lovingly paraphrase Buffy Saint-Marie's ode and anthem to the Universal Soldier, He's the Universal Man and he really is to blame, his orders come from far away no more, they come from him and you and me, so brothers and sisters can't you see, this is not the way to put an end to war.

Soldiers of a kind are universal fathers of families, clans, tribes, cities, provinces, nations, churches, sects, mosques, synagogues, ashrams, schools, school boards, corporations, or temples of one sort or another.





The City of Deux-Montagnes is inviting its citizens to shine a light—literally—on what makes their community beautiful, resilient, and vibrant. Through the lens of local photographers, the 2026 edition of the annual municipal photo contest aims to spotlight the town's luminous moments with this year's evocative theme: Deux-Montagnes en lumière (Deux-Montagnes in Light).

This civic initiative, spearheaded by the City's Communications Department, offers amateur photographers a chance not only to have their work featured in the official 2026 municipal calendar but also to contribute to a growing visual archive that celebrates shared identity and collective pride.

A community illuminated

Whether it's the golden glow of sunrise over the lake, the whimsical flicker of Halloween decorations, or the dramatic burst of fireworks at civic festivals, light plays a vital role in how residents experience their surroundings. This contest seeks to immortalize those ephemeral, often poetic moments—both dazzling and subtle—that reveal the soul of Deux-Montagnes across all four seasons.

From festive holiday cheer to quiet plays of light in natural settings, the theme encourages participants to explore how light brings life, emotion, and storytelling into the visual tapestry of their hometown.

Strengthening civic connection through art

At its heart, the contest is more than a celebration of photography—it's an act of civic engagement. By encouraging citizens to observe, appreciate, and capture their environment, the initiative fosters a deeper connection to place and community. In a time when digital images often feel fleeting, the municipal calendar offers

a tangible tribute to local creativity, curated with care and shared with every household.

How to participate

Participants must be residents of Deux-Montagnes and must submit original photographs that reflect the 2026 theme. The technical requirements are straightforward:

- Photos must be taken within Deux-Montagnes (with location clearly identified).
- Only horizontal (landscape) format will be accepted.
- Digital files must be of high resolution, suitable for 8.5" x 11" printing, and larger than 1.5 MB.
- A signed consent form will be required if identifiable individuals appear in the image (excluding the photographer).

Municipal employees and elected officials are not eligible to enter.

The submission deadline is October 1, 2025, visiting the City of Deux-Montagnes official website and entries must be sent in digital format. Finalists will be selected by the Communications Department and announced in mid-November.

Recognition and prizes

Winning images will be published in the 2026 municipal calendar, which is distributed to thousands of homes throughout Deux-Montagnes. In addition to local recognition, each finalist will receive a prize (to be announced), and one grand prize winner will receive a \$200 gift certificate to IGA Marché Lamoureux, a nod to the importance of supporting local business.

Light as a unifying element

In a society often fractured by speed and screens, initiatives like this remind us of the simple power of observation, the dignity of the everyday, and the role of shared experience in building civic cohesion. By framing Deux-Montagnes in light, the contest invites all residents to see their city—and each other—through a more thoughtful and generous lens.

Quebec's National Day; a holiday celebration that dates all the way back

In Canada, nearly 10 million people speak French. Held annually on June 24, the National Day of Quebec, formerly known as Saint-Jean-Baptiste Day, is an occasion for Francophones across the country to show their pride by celebrating their language and their traditions.

ORIGINS OF THE HOLIDAY

The origins of the National Day date back to immemorial times, when people celebrated the summer solstice. The tradition of this pagan holiday was for a large bonfire to be lit to symbolize the light that was at its peak. In Europe, mainly France, it was later attributed the name of Jean, the cousin of Jesus nicknamed "the Baptist", who first recognized and then baptized the Christ. That is how the link between the light and Saint-Jean-Baptiste was made.

A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY

In 1827, journalist Ludger Duvernay bought the newspaper La Minerve from Augustin-Norbert Morin, and it quickly became an important newspaper in Lower Canada. In March 1834, Ludger Duvernay, George-Étienne Cartier, and Louis-Victor Sicotte founded the society "Help yourself, the sky will help you", of which Duvernay is the president. The members gather to discuss politics and literature, conversations that lead to the revival of an interrupted tradition, idea developed by Duvernay. That tradition was the celebration of Saint-Jean-Baptiste. The purpose was to provide French-Canadian people with an annual national holiday.



On June 24, 1834, Duvernay organized a banquet in order to make this project come to life. About sixty people take part in it, and the banquet turned out to be

a real success. Newspapers encourage people to celebrate Saint-Jean-Baptiste in their village in order to promote the union of French Canadians. Duvernay won his bet: the following year, National Day celebrations spread in many villages.

It was mainly celebrated in Montreal and Quebec, but over the years expanded to several regions in the province. However, we had to wait until 1925 before it became official and was declared by the Quebec legislature to be a statutory holiday. This day eventually became an opportunity for people to gather and bear witness to the vitality and cultural richness of the French-Canadian nation. Despite multiple interruptions and obstacles in the course of its history, the holiday persisted and is still celebrated to this day.

THE NATIONAL DAY TODAY

The National Day of Quebec consists of:


- nearly 750 projects, from small to large, over as many sites, spread throughout the territory
- over 20,000 volunteers

- more than 1,050 shows, from singers to puppets, on the big stages of the Plains of Abraham or Maisonneuve Park
- more than 700 games organized for the whole family
- more than 360 bonfires
- more than 100 parades

In 2009, when marking the 175th anniversary of the National Day of Quebec, the Mouvement national des Québécoises and Québécois celebrated 25 years as the main coordinator of the holiday. They created the "Artisan de la Fête nationale" prize to highlight the invaluable support of those who give meaning to the holiday through their contribution. In this way, the thousands of volunteers who work every year to make the celebrations of the National Day a success are also honoured.

Francophone communities all across the country organize celebrations to honour Quebec, so be sure to stay on the lookout for events happening around you on June 24. For more information about the holiday or the celebrations in the province, visit the <u>fetenationale.quebec</u> website.





Hundreds participate in Rosemère's 37th annual "Rosemère en santé" family run

On Sunday, residents of Rosemère gathered in large numbers to take part in the 37^{th} edition

of Rosemère en santé, the town's annual family run promoting physical activity and community engagement.

Organized by the Town of Rosemère in partnership with the Fédération Québécoise d'Athlétisme, the event attracted more than 750

participants. With routes ranging from 1 kilometre to 10 kilometres, the run accommodated a wide range of fitness levels and age groups.

A community gathering

The event was hosted at École Alpha, which served as both the start and finish line for the races. One of the highlights of the day was the 3-kilometre "Course Alpha." Proceeds from this specific race are allocated to purchasing sports equipment for École Alpha, adding a fundraising component to the event.

Races for all ages

Participants included young children, teenagers, adults, and seniors, reflecting the event's family-oriented and inclusive nature. The 1K, 3K, 5K, and 10K options allowed individuals and families to choose distances appropriate to their abilities. All races were certified by the Fédération Ouébécoise d'Athlétisme.

Focus on health and sustainability

In keeping with the event's health-focused mission, hydration stations were made available along the course, and participants were offered light refreshments post-race. Informational booths on healthy living were also present.

Sustainability measures were integrated into the event's organization, including the use of recycled materials for medals and efforts to reduce single-use plastics.

A Rosemère tradition

Rosemère en santé has become a longstanding tradition in the municipality. Each year, it brings together schools, families, and community members to promote physical fitness and local pride. With its combination of athletics, education, and environmental awareness, the event is a well-established part of Rosemère's calendar.



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Misdiagnosed


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One voice, many hands

The Laurentians mobilize for a future without homelessness

On May 16, the Laurentians came together for the 3rd edition of the Journée de mobilisation des connaissances en itinérance, or Knowledge Mobilization Day on Homelessness, a vital gathering dedicated to addressing one of the region's most pressing social issues. Organized by the Integrated Health and Social Services Center (CISSS) of the Laurentians, in collaboration with the Université du Québec en Outaouais, Le Café Parenthèse, and Trait d'union jeunesse, the event took place under the unifying theme: "Acting Together Against Homelessness."

More than 200 stakeholders attended the event in Saint-Jérôme, representing a broad cross-section of society — researchers, community organizations, health care professionals, and public sector representatives. Together, they delved into the intricate realities of homelessness in the Laurentians, fostering both a deeper understanding of the issue and the will to take concrete action.

A day of dialogue and collective insight

The discussions throughout the day tackled the complex and sensitive issues surrounding homelessness, with a particular emphasis on vulnerable populations such as women and seniors experiencing homelessness — groups whose needs often go underrepresented in traditional strategies.

The event concluded with a workshop focused on defining the roles and responsibilities of each sector and individual involved. Participants reflected on how to more effectively collaborate across disciplines and institutions, with the goal of creating a more cohesive and responsive network of support for those experiencing homelessness.

A strong message from local leadership

Benoît Major, Deputy President and CEO of the CISSS des Laurentides, underscored the crucial need for sustained and unified efforts:

"This day of mobilization proves that homelessness is a priority for all community stakeholders in the Laurentians. Only by working together can we confront this significant collective challenge. I want to acknowledge the dedication of all participants and partners involved—not just today, but every day in the fight against homelessness. I am proud of the CISSS des Laurentides' unwavering commitment to this cause."

Continuing the work beyond the event

The Knowledge Mobilization Day served not just as a platform for dialogue, but as a launching



point for future action. Organizers emphasized the importance of transforming discussion into policy, research into practice, and partnerships into tangible support networks for the region's most vulnerable residents.


